SULLIVAN WINS TURKEY SHOOT

In Sunday nights Bowling Turkey Shoot competition was keen and fast with Charles Sullivan setting the pace with 195-178-201 games with a 96 pin handicap for a grand series of 848. Cliff was the only repeat winner for a turkey as he placed third the previous weekend, so he should have a plentiful supply of turkey for his Thanksgiving dinner. Thirty-one bowlers competed for the five turkeys at the Azalea Lanes, and everyone enjoyed the fine competition even though not all being able to win one of the turkeys for their dinners. 
