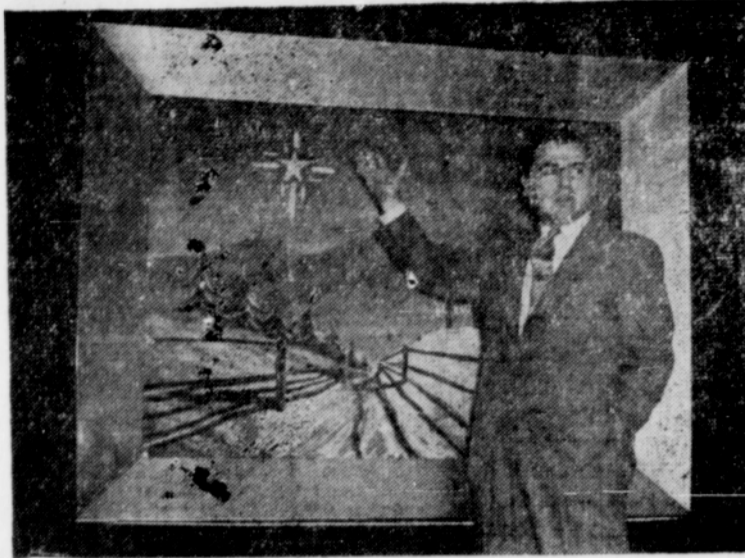
Not only do they give Art a boost in Brookings, but the Automotive Age has a lot to do with the two movements.
