HAMS PLAY PART IN RECENT FLOOD
 The part played by amateur radio addicts in the past disasters cannot be over estimated. One of their outstanding feats was the help given in the floods of the Coquille Valley, which involved bringing of help and hope to the stricken hamlet of Remote.
 One of the Gant children walked out, through the violent storm, to Myrtle Point, bringing word that a slide had overwhelmed a home, killing some and injuring children, and that approach to the community via Highway 42 was impossible because of slides. Telephone lines were out and the raging Coquille River was unfit for boat travel. Forseeing such disastrous conditions, the radio amateurs of Oregon had long ago set up and put into daily operation a system whereby every licensed amateur checked into the designated "Oregon Emergency Net," control station and adhered to that control station's rulings.
 Immediately upon getting word as to what had happened at Remote the "ham" at Myrtle Point got on the air and notified Net Control—notify him that another "ham" with an amateur transmitter in his car was proceeding with State Police, bulldozer, truck, and ambulance, out to the scene. Despite the tremendous amount of messages many of a very urgent nature, Net Control decreed they should all wait, that all amateur radio transmission on the net's wave length should cease, in order that the very weak signals, from down in the sharp valley of the Coquille, could be acted upon. It was thrilling to listen on this frequency. There wasn't one single peep and further, every amateur station was "eared" for their fellow "ham" out there in the fiercest storm ever known in the Coquille Valley. Not only that, but when a phenomena known as "skip" came with the darkness, when signals after their usual course and nearby stations are unheard, a fellow "ham" well down in California, lent a hand, picking up the mobile station and repeating back to Myrtle Point and Coquille and Empire.
 Thanks to the rigid, self-imposed cooperation of hundreds and hundreds of men and women who have spent untold hundreds of dollars on their equipment and bound themselves into an efficient fraternity not only was succor rendered to the stricken at Remote, but untold thousands all over these United States, have in one way or another, become indebted to this grand bunch of radio "nuts" More Power To Them!
