 Sirs,
 In my time I have seen city governments to some odd things, but the statement I have in hand for "sewer service" tops them all.

A tax, I could understand, (even though this city is overburdened with taxes now) since a city-owned sewage disposal plant would probably benefit the community. A bill, however, for sewer service which I do not receive, nor expect too—I own a septic tank, and am very happy with it—smacks a little raw.

I wonder if this city has obtained adequate legal council on this matter. Could a trial case hold up in a court of law? If you received a monthly fuel bill, say for oil which you did not order nor receive, would you pay it? Of course not. Am I going to pay the city \$36.00 a year for the privilege of using my own septic tank? Of course not!

The City of Brookings does not, to my knowledge, own the existing sewers within the city limits. I would assume therefore, that the City is going to go into competition with Mr. Bankus in the sewer business. This will be one of the few cities in the world whose citizens will have their choice of two sewer systems—both of which send out monthly statements. Of course, the City expects those who are already paying Mr. Bankus for the use of his sewer to pay their monthly bills so that they can go into competition with Mr. Bankus.

It would appear the the poor taxpayer is being squeezed between two opposing factions, much as two small children will fight over the same toy.

If this hassle keeps up much longer, lets all move to the country. Things are so much simpler there, all you do is to dig a hole, erect a shed over the spot, cut a halfmoon in the door, and forget your sewer problems.

The Editor:
 I, too, am billed for my share of a municipal sewer. I propose to pay a year in advance, although I installed a septic tank more than adequate for our needs.

While paying for my share of the fund, I hope it will be applied primarily, to my share of the benefits in better community sanitation. Should an epidemic start in one portion of our area it could rapidly spread to others whether that area was now or ever would be on the system.

I do not believe an exorbitant sum should be paid for a system which for the most part, was installed many years before most of us came to the City of Brookings, and which has not been expanded to a degree that would increase its value to the reported asking price. I understand a considerable portion of that system is now under private ownership and, as such, could possibly be cut off from use by these owners of numerous individual portions. I once owned property crossed by a sewer, and there was no note of this crossing in my deed. I do not think there was anything to prevent my plugging the sewer if I chose.

Further, taxes and sewer assessments will cost me around \$120 per year on our home. Considering the many benefits we now get, and in the future hope to get, we consider that \$120 a year very cheap rent and we are not even in the moderate income bracket. Many people spend much more than their taxes for things of less value they could easily do without.

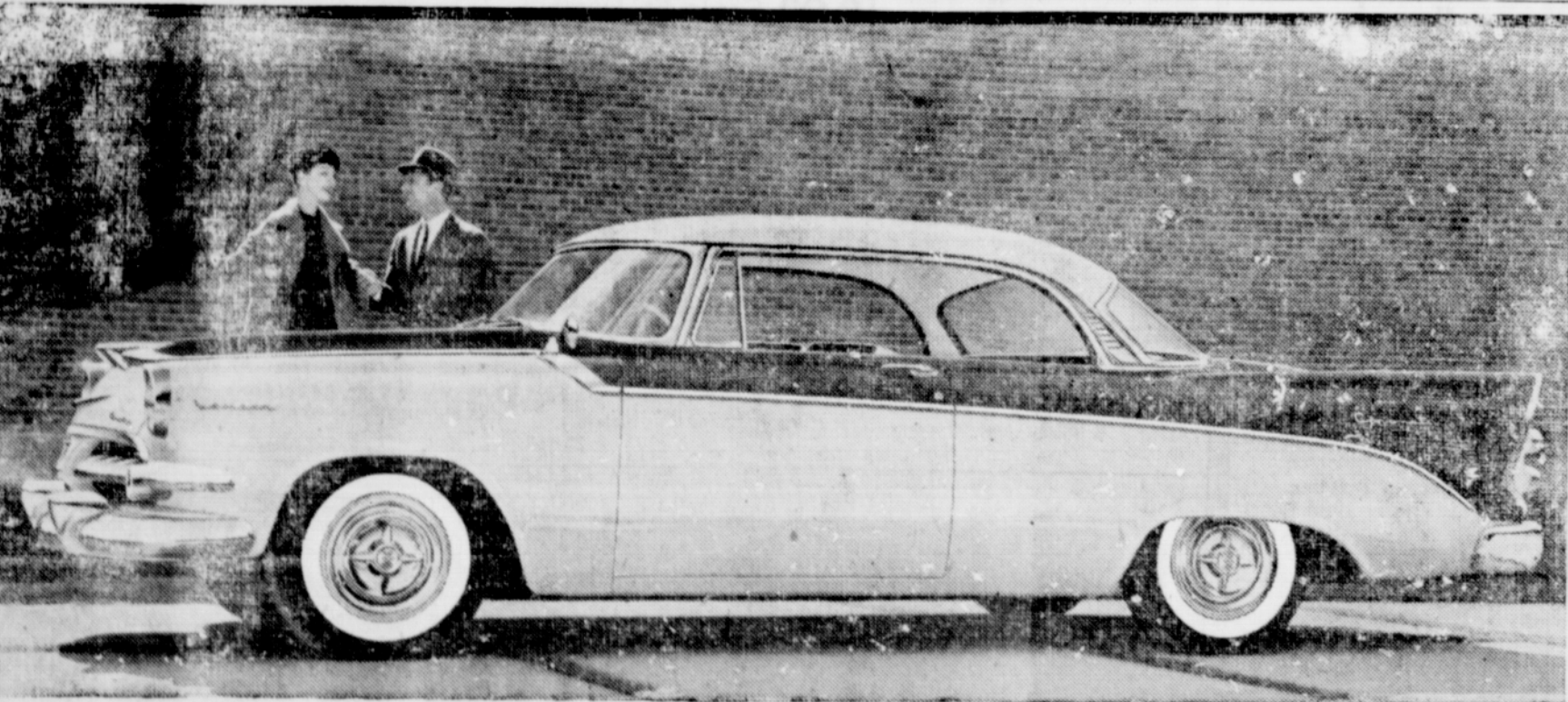
