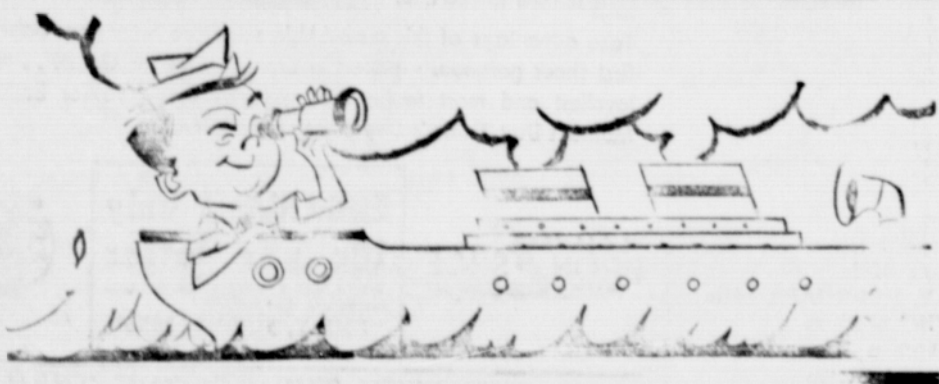

**1,700 ACRES FOR GRAZING LAND**

Approximately 1,700 acres of Forest Lands will be considered for classification as grazing on February 23rd, Robert Knox, Chairman of the Curry County Forest Land Classification Committee announced here Tuesday.

At the meeting, held in the County Extension Office, the members reviewed the classification work carried on since 1953 and considered possible changes in land use.

Rusty Lafferty, of the Coos Forest Protective Association, discussed a number of areas which had been cut-over, burned and seeded to forage grasses. The field work accomplished by Lafferty was done in accordance with requests which had been received by committee members.

Robert Knox, Chairman of the Committee, advised that proper classification of forest land should cut down forest production costs. Grazing lands, Knox added, can be developed for livestock use and lands classified for timber production can be taken care of as a tree farm. Knox also pointed out that few if any incendiary fires have occurred on any of the grazing lands since the classification act went into effect in 1938. The State Forest Department also reported that only a few fires had burned in the timber areas, and all were accidental.

The Committee advised that forest lands classified as Class 1 or timber class will pay the regular forest protection assessment. This rate is about 10 cents per acre. Lands coming under the grazing or Class 3 classification will pay a ceiling rate of 5 cents per acre. Last year, the Foresters said, the rate for Curry County was about 4.8 cents.

The Committee welcomed Arthur S. King, representing Oregon State College, as a new member. King replaced James C. Moore, who now operates the Del Cur Supply Cooperative, at Brookings.

Other members on the committee are: Stanley Colegrove, Robert Knox, N. B. Marsh and Homer Lyons, of Salem.

Description of lands to be considered on February 23rd can be found at the County Agents Office, the Coos Forest Patrol office and will be carried in the legal section of the Curry County Reporter.

**AN OPEN LETTER**

Honorable Judge Guy Forsyth, and members of the Curry County Court

Gentlemen: It has come to our attention through a report released by the State Health Department, that according to their statistics that Curry County now has a population in excess of 10,000 people, at 10,630. This has been published in the Oregon Voter, and the Oregon Business Review.

That is the fact. We doubt whether the judge, or any of the other members of the court, question the figures. We're sure that you all know that the population of the county is in excess of even those figures. For example, through the reliable meter counting of the Coos-Curry Co-op, and their estimates, and through the count of the Brookings and Harbor Post Offices we find that an estimated 5,000 people live within the Brookings-Harbor area.

Now, according to Oregon Law, Sect. 294.250 on publication and Oregon Law, Sect. 294.255 on County Court Proceedings, each county whose population is in excess of 10,000 people shall publish their proceedings in two official newspapers of general circulation. In other words there shall be two official newspapers in counties of more than 10,000 population.

The people of this area want to know about their county government, and we feel in view of the law they are entitled to.

According to the above, you gentlemen don't seem to have such choice, in all fairness, except to obey the state law as quoted.

**DUNCAN PLUMBING and SHEET METAL** is operated by Glenn Duncan with the assistance of his wife, Rena, as the bookkeeper.
