

WHAT SCHOOL MEANS TO ME

School, to me, means a better way to a happier life. Without school I don't see how people could live an easy life. Many people have died so others could have freedom, and without freedom we could not have good schools like the one I am enrolled in now.

We, the students of this school, should be very thankful we have a school at all. In some countries, children do not know what school is, and in this country, about a hundred years ago, most boys could not go to school because they had to help their fathers with the work at home. Some girls went through elementary school, but no more than that, because they had to help at home, too. Girls were never required to have much schooling, though, because they almost never used it. They usually got married when they were young and spent their time at home, cooking, sewing and taking care of their families. It was always thought that a woman's place was at home, but now that idea is old-fashioned. At this present date you will find women working in almost every occupation in most of the countries of the world.

Even most of our grand parents did not get more than a grammar school education, but more was not required in those days. Now, you need more than a high school education for al-

most any occupation. It is getting so a person has to specialize in one certain occupation, instead of moving around from one job to another as they did before. Then a person could be a jack-of-all-trades, but now a person would find it hard to get almost any kind of a job because you would have to have a certain kind of education.

The government is advertising more and more for people to specialize in one certain job, such as scientists, engineers or laboratory technicians. The government is also offering free thousand-dollar scholarships to high school students who get a high average in their grades. This is to encourage more students to go to college and to get training for the occupations where they are needed most.

The government is also working more and more with the boards of education to encourage boys and girls to decide what occupation they will take, in later life. Not long ago I read an article in a popular magazine that said there was such a need for specialized education in some of the fields such as science, aeronautics, mechanical engineering and laboratory technician that the government was willing to give aptitude tests to seventh and eighth grade students so they could decide what kind of job they wanted even before they entered high school.

In school, you first learn to read, then to write, then you learn to figure with numbers. Higher up, you learn manners, methods of speech, and many others. Now, in the seventh grade, I take social studies, Reading, Spelling, Arithmetic, Physical Education and Health. For activities, I have chosen Art. We learn many things in art, such as printing posters, making pottery, block printing, and drawing.

In High School you learn Algebra, Science, Geography, Literature, Geometry, Mechanical Drawing and many others. Further on, in college, you learn certain courses that will help you in later life.

The people of the community pay taxes so their children may go to school, and those taxes have been raised in Brookings, recently because of the new high school built here last year. If it had not been for the plywood mill built here five years ago, there would not have been so much a demand for school room.

When the mill was built, there was a demand for more workers and the workers brought their children with them. When more children came to school, there was a demand for more school room so they built more school rooms. This year, in Brookings, there was more than one thousand pupils enrolled in this school last year, the number of pupils was about nine hundred.

Education first started in Greece, in Sparta and Athens, and was not quite known as education then, but as lectures, or classes. Then, when Greece was conquered by Rome, the Romans did not scorn learning but took up most of the Greek ways of culture. When Rome was conquered by the barbarians, the Roman Catholic Church kept writings and ceremonials in libraries. By a decree of Justinian, 529 A.D., Church schools were the only schools allowed to exist. These schools had no object but the teaching of religion. Then they taught gradually more and more subjects.

Now, some schools have fully equipped kitchens for the girls, and fully equipped shops for the boys. For the girls, the kitchens are to help teach them how to cook and be homemakers. For the boys, the shops are to help them with jobs they may want in later life.

Schools also have projects, to teach their students responsibility and how to work together. Some of these projects are raising livestock, and having a school program for the radio.

California is a good example of a school system, because you can go to night school free of charge, for as long as you want. For example, I have an uncle who went to night school for three months each year for the past few years, and when he got an extra degree in law at almost

no expense. Another uncle of mine works for the International Business Machines, and was sent to Washington, D.C. for six months to test a machine and see if it made any mistakes. He also had to have night schools to keep up with new discoveries, and finding things out so he would have an up-to-date knowledge of his business.

So now, as you can see, you must have a very good education to get anywhere.

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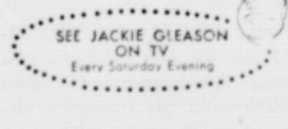
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
