Following a long illness, Mrs. Jessie Becker passed away on Monday, February 13th, at the Seaside Hospital in Crescent City. She was born in Petaluma, California, on the 18th day of December, 1888, and came with her husband, Leroy, to make their home in Brookings, in 1938, building the beautiful ocean cliff home now owned by the Erskine Millers. During her residence here she was very active and progressive in civic affairs, having canvassed the area for the original memberships in the REA Cooperative, and was one of the early founders and earnest workers in what developed into the Azalea Garden Club. Her earlier business experiences, and especially in meeting and congenially dealing with all of the public, made her an especially good and sympathetic neighbor.

After selling their oceanside home, the Beckers bought acreage in Harbor where she and her husband developed a true high-way beauty spot.

Besides her husband, she leaves to mourn their loss, sisters Mrs. Fannie Berger, of Petaluma; Mrs. Mable Allen, San Francisco; and brother, Frank Munday, of Connecticut.

The funeral services were conducted at Roeder's Funeral Chapel, by the Rev. Willard Spencer, of the Brookings Assembly of God Church, and interment in the Masonic Cemetery, in Crescent City.
