COW HEALTH — Curry County was among the first to be awarded certification by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, as a Bangs Disease free area. It still maintains a very low percentage of reactors to Brucellosis. Benton, Gilliam and Wasco counties all showed clear of the disease while Curry and Josephine were scored the next two lowest in the state. Of the 4,508 checked by Federal D.V.s, only 4 reacted in Curry County and of the 8,084 tested in Josephine only 7 reacted, in both

instances checking 0.08 percent. Coos County had 32 reactors or 0.179 percent of the 17,790 tested. Crook County had the most diseased cows with 223 showing bugs out of the 3,090 checked or 7.21 percent. Totals for the entire state: 296,852 tests, 1,632 reactors or 0.55 percent.
