DEATH CLAIMS DELAS MAAS OF SMITH RIVER

Delas Henry Maas, of Smith River, passed away at Seaside Hospital, following a three-day illness from a paralytic stroke.

Born at Smith River, May 12, 1886, he was the son of the late Peter and Susan Maas, and lived there his entire life. For nearly 38 years he drove the truck for the Smith River Creamery.

Survivors are a sister, Mrs. Ethel Goodlin, Smith River and a brother Ernest Maas, of Eureka; stepson, Everett Reckman and a step-daughter Mrs. Evelyn Horn of Caminos, California; a sister-in-law, Miss Flossie Bales

of Smith River and a number of cousins.

He was well known to all the older residents of the Smith River valley.

Funeral services were held from Wier's Mortuary Chapel, Saturday afternoon, conducted by Rev. James Shelton, and interment in the family plot at Smith River.

TRAVEL COSTS —

The Oregon State Motor Association has put out figures as to the savings to travellers because of certain highway improvements. One such is a Port Orford and Gold Beach round trip saving of \$2.48 when using the new stretch as against what it cost over the old route.

On this basis the considerable savings to the motorist that would accrue if and when (if ever) the state gets around to acknowledging the allegiance of this part of the world.

The highway between here and Gold Beach, is at present in an atrocious condition. The mechanical damage to passenger and commercial equipment must be very great. This depreciation to the owner's vehicle must be tremendous. Traveller's discomfort added to the actual cost and inconvenience will count against all of Oregon when the tourist season gets underway.

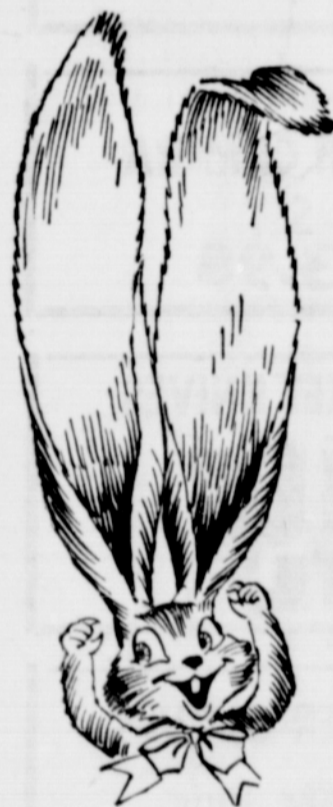

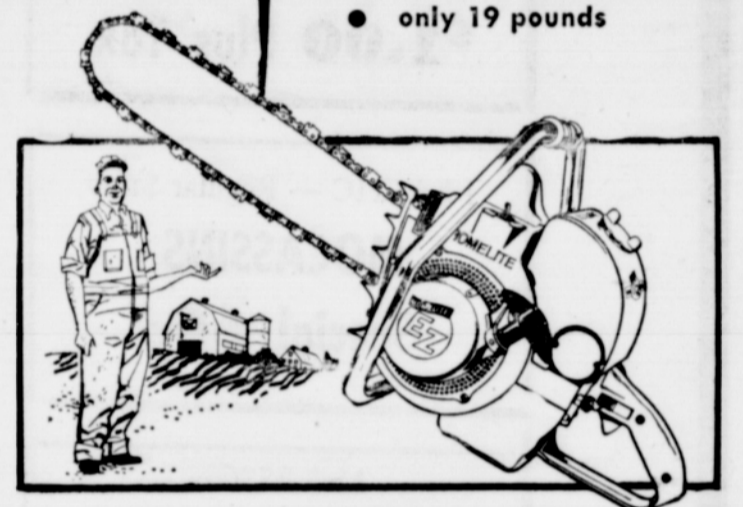
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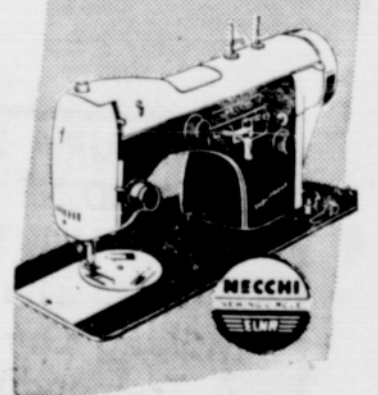
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
