A solemn warning to all the younger drivers is found in the Secretary of State's report on 1955 traffic accidents.

Of the 412 reported killed in car wrecks, by far the highest number were in the age group between 18 and 24, which took 55 males and 15 females, or a total of 70 lives. The next highest group was between 30 and 39, which included the heads of many young families, in which 49 males and 13 females were wiped out for a total of 62 and the third highest group, those over 65, tallied 53 lives—37 men and 16 women. This latter group were responsible for the highest pedestrian-traffic fatal-

ities in which 23 lost their lives—15 men and 8 women.

By far the greatest number of reported accidents involved more than one car, a total of 56,303 of the whole 65,741, and in this summary of accidents, 54,991 involved property damage of some kind or other.

Between 4:00 and 4:59 p.m. seems to be the most popular time to have an accident, according to the report, and Friday seems to be a great favorite, among the days of the week. From 4:00 to 4:59 a.m. on Monday morning is statistically, the safest time to be prowling about the highways.

THE BROOKINGS CAMERA SHOP is like much of the other Brookings business world. It is operated by people who came from another part of the nation and opened a business here just because they liked it here and saw possibilities for the future.

Ed and Tillie Strong originally came from Chicago. Mr. Strong became interested in photography in the windy city in 1926. Portland was not quite far enough West for the Strongs, although they did engage in business there for a number of years.

It was in April of 1952 when they decided that lower Curry County offered an opportunity for the future. And it was then that they opened a camera shop or studio over the old bank building. In February of the following year they moved to their present location next to the Par Store, in the Goetz building. At that time they added mater-

ially to their line of camera supplies and equipment, which included movie projectors and accessories. In addition to the camera supply business they also specialize in single, family and group photos.

HAROLDS JEWELRY STORE is owned and operated by former Eastern Oregon people, John Day, to be exact. Harold and Hazel Moore bought out the W. Jones Jewelry and after modernizing the quarters and adding several lines were ready to open July 1st of last year.

Harold had been in the jewelry business for 12 years before coming here. He worked as a partner in his father's store. With this background in the business he has insisted upon offering the finest repair service in all lines of jewelry, including watches, clocks, razors and all associate items.

The Moores moved here for two reasons. They had long held a desire to locate on the Oregon Coast and after looking over the area they decided that the City of Brookings had the nicest climate and held the greatest opportunities for the future in business. They have 2 boys, Ronnie, who is nine, and Larry who is twelve years old.

THE HOUSE OF SHOES is owned and operated by Amber Campbell. She opened the store in April 1953 in the Goldsberry Building, and later, March 1955, moved to the present location in the Kerr Building.

Mrs. Campbell is happy with the progress of the shoe store and is emphatic in saying this is the only place to live, he is active in club and civic work in the Brookings-Harbor area.

The couple have a son, Richard, who attended high school here and is now a member of the U. S. Army Engineers.

SHEHAN'S CLOTHING is a brand new business opened in November 1955. Robert T. and Dorothy Shehan are not exactly strangers to Brookings. Peggy Gould is a sister of Mr. Shehan's mother and they have visited often with Mickey and Peggy. Before coming here he sold used cars for Lou Blanc in Coos Bay. Previous to that, Shehan had served 8 years with the J. C. Penny Company, which has given him considerable background in the clothing business.

The store is located across from the O.K. Rubber Welders in the Johnson-Hurst Building, and is new and modern in every detail. They feature the latest in men's work dress and also sports wear.

The couple have a daughter, Coleene Johnson, who is with her husband in the service, at Fort Riley, Kansas.

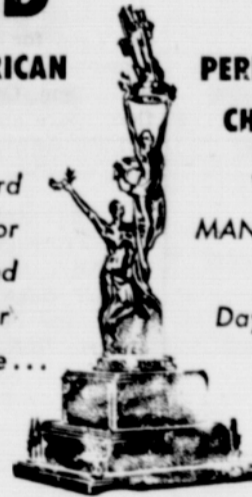

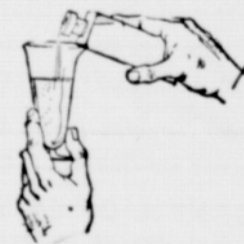
