**ELECTION LAWS FOR OREGON VOTERS**

Closing date for registering voters is April 17th — 30 days preceding Primary Election.  
 (Sections 240.050, 247.120, 249.510)

★ ★ ★

If the name of a registered elector has been changed by marriage, she should re-register and cancel out her old registration. Any person who may complete his residence or become 21 years of age during the time the registration books are closed preceding elections, may register now.  
 (Section 247.180)

★ ★ ★

If an elector wishes to vote for someone whose name does not appear on the ballot, he may write in the name of the person for whom he wishes to vote.  
 (Section 247.050)

Precinct Memorandum cards are being mailed to registered voters from the County Clerk's office. If you are not in the precinct named on the card, return card to Clerk, either by mail or in person, notifying her of correct precinct and a new card will be issued.

**ROT PROTECTION CLUES** — To prevent water reaching the wooden timbers upon which a structure is built, place several thicknesses of tar paper between the concrete or stone base and the wood. Make the paper barrier considerably wider than the surfaces, to better deter capillary attraction which would otherwise draw water from the ground into the wood, thereby promoting rot.
