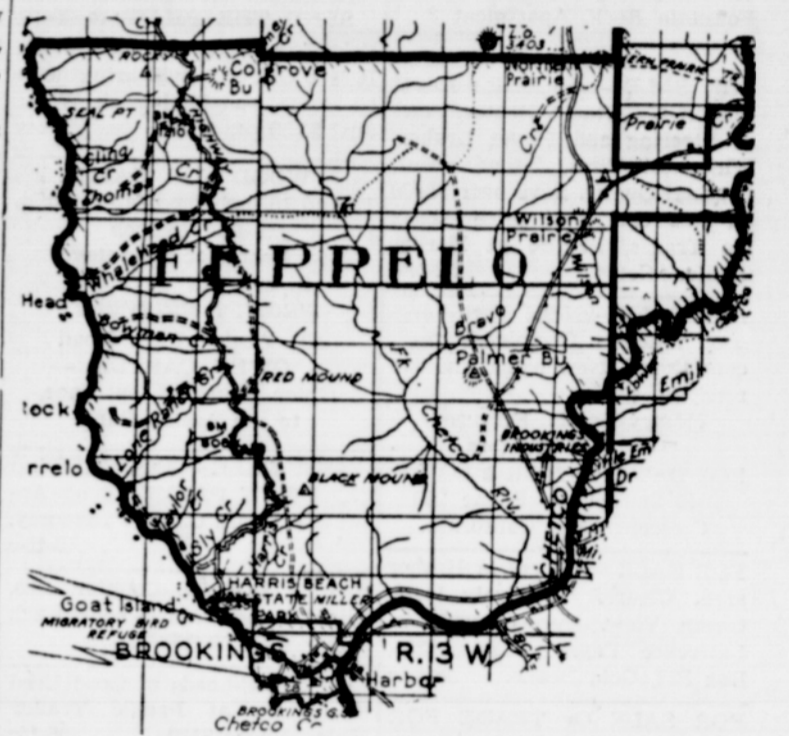
## — VOTERS NOTICE —

**BROOKINGS PRECINCT NO. 2 —**  
All residents on the Easterly side of Highway 101 and between the Chetco River and city limit boundary on the North of Brookings.

**FERRELO PRECINCT —**  
All residents not residing within the city limits of Brookings and North of the Chetco River. (See Map)



The registered voters residing in these Precincts should notify Oleta A. Walker, County Clerk, Gold Beach at once, stating their precinct, so their names will be listed in the proper poll book.
