SOME COMMON FALLACIES ABOUT WOOD

BY Forest Products Laboratory, Forest Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture

FALLACY 4—That wood used in construction is under all conditions more dangerous than steel in case of fire.

It is true that wood when exposed to fire temperatures will burn and be converted to charcoal, whereas steel does not burn under similar exposure conditions. But wood, when used in heavy timber construction, has a tremendous advantage over unprotected steel.

For structural purposes, the working strength of unprotected wrought iron and steel as reported in Johnson's Materials of Construction, must be regularly diminishing while the temperature increases, the rate of diminution being about 4 percent per 100° F. increase in temperature.

It is for this reason that steel members are commonly required to be enclosed in concrete or some other protective material.
