HIGHWAY MONEY COMING?

If the long range highway construction bill is cleared by the Senate, within a reasonable time, writes Congressman Harris Ellsworth, it can mean an expenditure of 18 million dollars more on Oregon highways this calendar year and a total of nearly 45 million dollars, next year, Oregon's growing population, Ellsworth continues, makes it the most needed class for the accelerated highway construction program.

The users of the highway will pay for them. The tax portion of the bill provides that the tax money collected goes into a trust fund from which payments for the highway program are made.

Another instance of disregard of our area was recently brought to light, this time chargeable to an oversight on the part of one of the major oil companies.

The Brookings agency for this company is consistently topping the sales record of all the stations in the Bay area, yet this station, unlike all the others, receives no co-operative advertising. Veterans' applications must be filed by June 11th with the Bureau of Reclamation, 212 West First Avenue, Kennewick, Washington. Applications are available in Oregon through county veterans' service officers or from the Department of Veterans' Affairs, State Finance Building, Salem, or State Office Building, Portland.

Mr. and Mrs. Clifford Beam drove over from Kerby to attend the Choral Club Concert. Mrs. Beam was a former member.

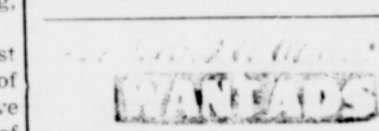
A beautiful showing of azaleas are now in full bloom at the Almo Newton home, on 101, just south of Harbor.
