**Students Asked To Get Cards**

Now is the time for high school students and others to get their social security cards if they plan to work during the summer months, according to Carlos L. Hunsinger, District manager of the Eureka office of the Social Security Administration.

Mr. Hunsinger said that there are very few jobs which do not require a social security card. He pointed out that individuals should take good care of their social security cards so that they can show them to their employers when taking new jobs. In this way they will be sure their employment records are correct and the accounting operations of the Social Security Administration can be carried on with greater economy.

"Also any prospective summer vacation worker who has lost his social security account number card should file at once for a duplicate card. Application blanks can be obtained from any post office or from the Social Security Administration office, 206 Post Office Building, Eureka.

**MEDICINE CABINET O.K.?**

When's the last time you inspected the family medicine chest? If you take a minute to take a look, you will probably find half-empty medicine bottles that should have been thrown out months ago, rusty razor blade and other miscellaneous items that have been long forgotten. For safety's sake, clean it out, and at the same time, make sure you have stocked the basic necessities that are needed to protect your family—iodine and first-aid bandages, eye drops aspirin, smelling salts and salve for treating household burns.

A bulletin from the State Bureau of Labor urges all teen-agers seeking industrial employment for the first time this summer to have their proof of age on record with the labor bureau as soon as possible. Parents are requested to cooperate in securing information on the minor's permit procedure established by state law, in order that any delay may be avoided in the issuance of a work permit when employment is offered. It is estimated that six or seven thousand teen-agers will be working in non-agricultural industries during the height of the summer season. The majority is expected to be 16-year-olds and 17-year-olds, many with their first industrial job.

Labor Commissioner Norman O. Nilson states the labor bureau aims to assist the young beginners in taking jobs promptly while performing its duty of

protecting them from harmful employment. He points out that the chief reason for the withholding of a permit upon application is failure of the minor to supply sufficient evidence of age upon which all work legalities depend. This can mean the loss of a job if the employer needs an immediate worker as most employers follow legal regulations by having minor permits in their possession before putting them to work, according to Nilson. The permit serves to protect the employer against unwitting violations of both state and federal child labor acts.

The bulletin lists four types of documents as acceptable for minors' evidence of age. They include the official birth certificate from a state department of vital statistics, baptismal certificate with church seal, insurance policy of one year's standing or affidavit from parent, school and physician. Proof of age may be recorded with the labor bureau at the time of or before making application for a work permit. Once recorded it need not be submitted again with any permit application.

Nilson says it would expediate many permit procedures if minors learned that the following are not acceptable as proof of age: driver's license or car insurance policy, hospital birth certificate, draft or registration card, health insurance card or any document in the acceptable group if it shows signs of alteration. Permits are issued through many employment offices in the state as well as from the labor bureau.

**LIBRARY ACTIVITY —**
