

Receives Letter From Sen. Morse

Carl Johnson, Brookings, received the following letter Tuesday from Oregon Senator Kayne Morse. The information in this letter is of sufficient local interest to warrant its publishing in full in the Pilot.

The letter follows:
Dear Mr. Johnson:
Many thanks for your good letter of May 4 which you and Mrs. Johnson indicated that even though you are registered Republicans, you intend to support me in the November general election. As you may surmise, the going is very rough for one who exercises complete independence of judgement in the United States Senate. Consequently, your words of encouragement and support are not only heartening but make this job seem really worthwhile.
I noted your comments concerning the difficulty of traveling over highway 101 from Brookings to Gold Beach and in view of what you had to say, I am checking with the Bureau of Public Roads in Washington to see if any assistance might be available. I anticipate that this may be the type of problem that is handled solely by State officials but the seriousness of the situation seems to me to warrant a check into the poss-

ability of Federal assistance. As soon as I have word, I shall get in touch with you promptly.
On the subject of the economic development of the Brookings area, I thought you would like to know that on the House side, as well as in the Senate, funds are appropriated for the Chetco River and Harbor project. I have asked that construction of Public Roads in Washington to be approved. The Army Engineers advise me that they could use \$225,000 to initiate construction during the fiscal year 1957. Accordingly, on May 1 I appeared before a subcommittee of the Senate Appropriations Committee and requested that \$225,000 be appropriated for this project during the coming fiscal year. I shall do everything possible to support this appropriation because I know how important it is for the future development of the Brookings area.


