CONVENTIONS—The City of Portland has released figures showing that the 11cents per delegate paid to entice conventions returned 403 groups consisting of 116,000 delegates plus their guests, who spent an average of \$24.35 per day, or a total of \$8,349,072.00. The Portland Chamber of Commerce is budgeting \$13,235, this year, to attract more conventions.

CITY TAX INCREASES

At the recent election a very slim majority carried the Gold Beach measure to increase the tax base there to take care of added expenditures. The vote was 182 "yes" and 176 "no". In Port Orford a similar measure won by a 182 to 102 vote. The Port of Port Orford port district approved the issuance of bonds amounting to \$79,972.25 for improvement to the docking facilities there, by a vote of 31 to 15, according to reports.

INTERESTING BOOKS

One of the most interesting books on Oregon is "The Last Mountains" by Robert and Victoria Case, a recent addition to the local library. While dealing with most of Oregon, it also hinges, primarily, on the Oregon influences of the Cascade Range and few who read it can say "We knew that all the time." The book deals with many phases of Oregon life, both of the present and away back into the past, and cities many records of which all Oregonians can well be proud if they learn them. The work is extended, as need be, to the adjoining states of Washington and California as far as the Cascade and Coast Ranges are concerned.

Many people have wondered how ancient writings could be deciphered, how Biblical stories have been verified, how long man has appeared in concrete history. Those and many, many more details having to do with the actual dawn of recorded history will be found in "Gods, Graves and Scholars" by C. W. Ceram, an archeologist skilled in setting down so lawmen can understand the otherwise dry technical work of those who have turned up the entrancing information Ceram simplifies. Among other data the writer tells of his fellow searchers turning up evidence of the Flood, the exacting astronomical data of the Aztecs, and the arguable possibility that the ruins unearthed right in Mexico City may well be the oldest in the world.
