Consolidated Names Manager For New Office

Pete Basich has been named as the new agent for Consolidated Freight in Brookings. Mr. Basich will be the first such agent in Brookings and will have an office in the new Consolidated building, now under construction here.

Previously, all such work was done out of the Coos Bay office. Basich will be living right in Brookings and will move his family here shortly. Basich and his wife, Marianne, have three children, Patricia 6, Mary 4, and Janet, 9 months. Basich is being transferred here from Tacoma where he has been with Consolidated for eight years.

The building will be ready for occupancy about the middle of June. Basich will be adding a clerk, and the two drivers will remain in Brookings. As local manager, Basich will handle collections, and other managerial necessities.

STATE TO OPEN NEW BIDS ON HIGHWAY

For the second time the State Highway Commission will receive bids for improvement of Highway 101 in Brookings, and also the grading and paving of Pioneer Road. The bids will be opened on June 4 and 5, and if approved the work would begin shortly after.

Last month the bids were all turned down by the State Highway Commission because they were higher than the engineers' estimates.

Plans call for grading and paving of Pioneer Road between Pacific Avenue and Easy Street, and grading and paving on Easy from Pioneer Road westerly for about 370 feet. Plans also call for paving the school bus parking area on Easy Street. Pioneer Road will be improved to a width of 53 feet and Easy Street to a width of 38 feet. The state will furnish \$15,000 towards the cost of the work. It is scheduled for completion this fall.

The improvement of 1.23 miles of Coast Highway in Brookings is also scheduled. Plans call for straightening and reconstruction of the highway to a two-lane status from Park View Drive to East Street, and widening the highway to four lanes from Easy Street to Pacific Avenue. The two lane section will be 38 feet wide and the four lane section will, in general, be 68 feet wide, between concrete curbs. Pavement is to be asphaltic concrete.

Another project involves the extension of the camping area in the Harris Beach State Park. The work will include the construction of a latrine, extension of the water supply system and electrical system and grading and surfacing of additional road ways, trailer stalls and camp sites to the east of the present improved area. The project is scheduled for completion on or before November 30th.

Robert Breeding Services Are Held

Funeral services for Robert O. Breeding, 68, of Brookings, were held at the Presbyterian Church in Rogue River, Oregon, on Monday, May 28th at 2:00 p.m. with the Rev. D. F. Barnett officiating. Concluding services were at the Woodville Cemetery. The Brown Mortuary was in charge.

Mr. Breeding was born in Rogue River on January 18, 1888 the son of William and Sarah Breeding. He had spent all of his life in that area and was married there to Myrtle Carrough, who survives. They have made their home in Brookings for the last few years.

Surviving besides his widow, are a son, Lloyd S. Breeding, of Eagle Point, Oregon; 3 daughters, Mrs. Jennie Jones, of Rogue River, Mrs. Edna Schultz, of Ontario, California and Mrs. Dora Britson of Brookings; 2 brothers, John, of Rogue River and James of Kirby, Oregon and also a sister, Mrs. Laura Farlow, of Central Point, Oregon. Also 11 grand children survive.

Recommendations Are Given Curry County Court

Recommendations by the Taxation and Finance Committee of the Curry County Economic Survey Council were released this week. Chairman Charles Glayshel headed the group, and a copy of the recommendations were sent to the Curry County Court and to all budget committee members.

Recommendations were: 1. A county sanitarian not be hired until services now rendered by the state department of health are no longer available.

2. No funds be allotted for the purpose of financing a County Chamber of Commerce until such an organization is incorporated and a definite program of work is presented.

3. An additional Deputy assessor be added to the present staff for the express purpose, only, of working 100 percent on the re-appraisal problem of forest land in Curry County.

4. The amount of \$7,200 be budgeted for the salary and travelling expense of a juvenile counselor.

5. Recommend that the salary of elective county officials be increased to \$6,000 per annum.

6. The Curry County Court give serious considerations to the appointment of a Curry County planning board as authorized under O.R.S.

7. The Curry County Court establish a cost accounting system, as set up by a qualified Cost Accountant, and that the present County Treasurer be considered and contacted relative to performing this additional duty. Also the budget committee consider the budgeting of additional necessary funds for salary
