**TRAVEL UPSWING**

Based on the increase of inquiries already being handled by the Oregon Coast Association offices there should be 30 to 50 percent more tourists on 101 this summer than last. Using this increase as part of a formula, tourist business along the coast will reach \$66,000,000, the highest ever.

Tillamook County Judge Otto Effenberger, president of the association, says the State Travel Information Division, at Salem estimated that out-of-state tourists spent \$127 million in Oregon in 1955, and the division found that 40 percent of all the visitors to the state came to the Oregon Coast. On this basis, the Tillamook County Judge said, the Oregon Coast is due to harvest \$66 million out of a total of \$165,100,000 brought into the state by the visitors.
