**AREA 4 — RESOLUTION NO. 19 NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN:**  
That the report of the City Engineer, as provided and required to be submitted in Resolution No. 12 adopted March 13th, 1956, covering and establishing a Special Assessment District within the corporate limits of Brookings, Oregon, known as Pioneer—Pacific—Easy Streets, Street Improvement has been filed in the office of the Recorder as of June 11th, 1956, and is available for examination in said recorder's office. The estimated probable cost of such proposed improvements is \$9,475.00.

A brief statement of the area proposed to be assessed for such improvement is as follows to-wit:

**A TRACT OF LAND IN SECTIONS 5, Township 41-S, of Range 13 West, W.M., LOCATED WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF BROOKINGS, OREGON, CURRY COUNTY AND MORE PARTICULARLY DESCRIBED AS FOLLOWS:**

**EASY STREET:**  
From the intersection of the center line of Easy Street and the West line of Pioneer; Thence following the center line of Easy Street, West 330 feet.

All persons interested in the hereinabove set forth and mentioned Special Assessment District are hereby notified to appear before the Council of the City of Brookings, at the hour of 8:00 o'clock P.M., on June 26th, 1956, in the City Hall of said City, and present their objections, if they have any, to the aforesaid improvement.

**BUG STATION TRAFFIC —**  
There was a dropping off of car check-ins to the state of California, May 1956 as against May of 1955. Thirty thousand less cars entered this year, during May, than last year. There were more trucks passing into the state in the same month of 1956 than there were in 1955, but the total passengers entering the Sunshine State fell from some 924,000 in May of '55 to 834,000 this past May. This makes 90,000 less passengers into the state and the greatest drop was in those who went in California licensed cars—some 73,000.
