Commercial holly growers can effectively control soft brown scale by spraying plantings now with malathion, according to Robert Every, Oregon State College entomologist.

Malathion at the rate of 1 1/2 pounds of actual chemical in 100 gallons of water is recommended. It will clean up infestations of the insect that secretes "honeydew" which is a food supply for

a fungus that gives leaves a black sooty appearance that downgrades holly. Malathion is most effective during warm weather and the insect moves about more at this time of the year. Every says in recommending spraying as soon as possible.

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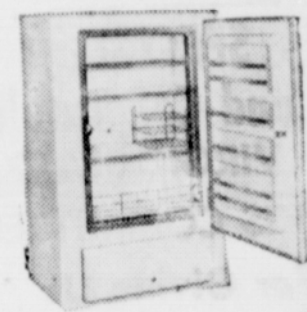
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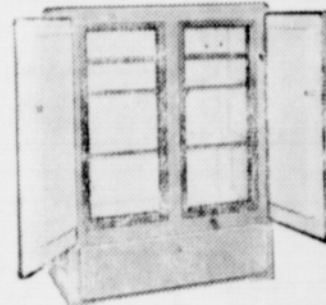


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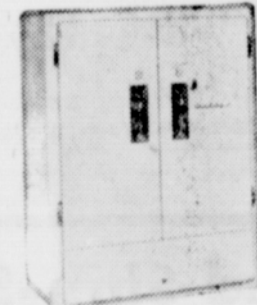


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
