**Irrigation Wells Must Be Registered**

Irrigation wells of Oregon constructed prior to August 3, 1955 must be registered, according to an act of the last state legislature. The purpose of this registration is the conservation of ground water and does not apply to wells used by a single family or group, for domestic purposes not exceeding 15,000 gallons a day; for stock watering, lawn or commercial garden not exceeding a half acre; or single industrial or commercial use not exceeding 5,000 gallons per day.

The deadline for registration is August 3, 1958 and there's a penalty attached for failure to register the well. A filing fee is required, depending upon the acre on which the water is used. Applicants for registration must be prepared to submit data concerning his well.

Eastern Oregon wells have been similarly registered since 1927.

**Bighorn Sheep On Hart Mountain Show Increase**

Oregon's desert bighorn mountain sheep must have found the rimrock country at Hart Mountain much to their liking. At home on their native range, the herd has increased at a phenomenal pace in the two years they've ranged the Hart Mountain slopes.

Frank Grogan, district game biologist at Lakeview, said that seven new lambs have arrived this spring, and from the appearance of other ewes an increase of 13 or 14 more is expected. The original herd of 20 bighorns transplanted from British Columbia in November of 1954 by the Oregon Game Commission now numbers 32 animals, according to Grogan, an increase of 12 animals. Six lambs were born in the spring of 1955, only a few months after they were brought into the state, and seven new additions so far this year. One old ewe which died last year has been the only mortality to date.

Visitors are welcome at the Hart Mountain area to view the graceful rimrock dwellers which are enclosed in an area encompassing approximately some 1000 acres. Don't be too optimistic or disappointed however, for the enclosure covers some of the roughest terrain on the Hart Mountain escarpment with many

places for the desert bighorns to hide. Trained biologists who are familiar with the bighorn's home have on occasion spent hours within the enclosure searching without success for some of them.
