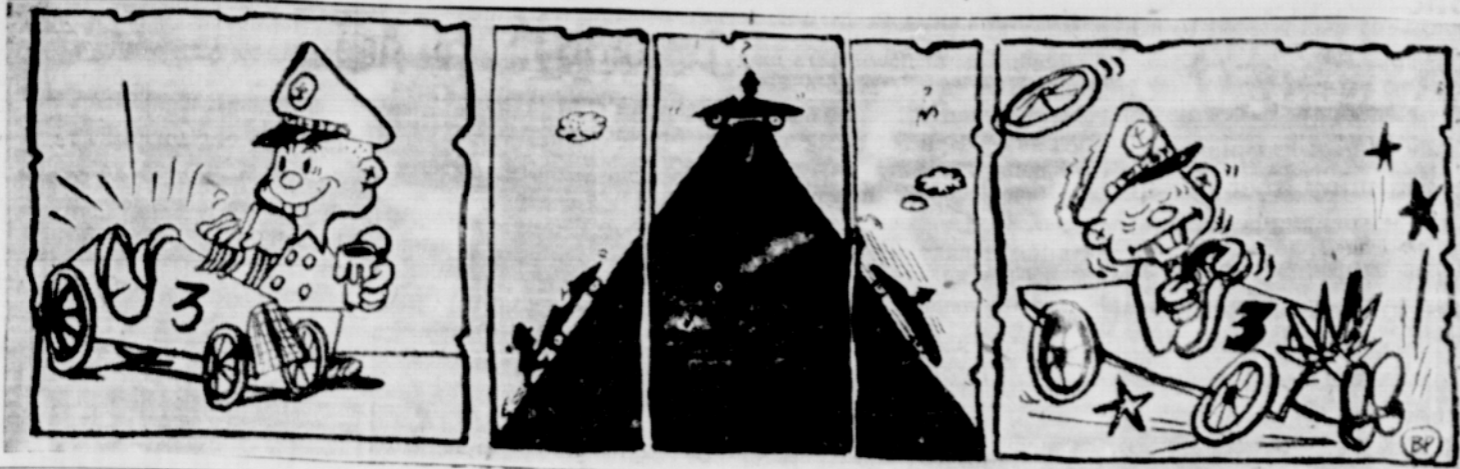

FLOWER SHOW RESULTS LISTED

Lower Chetco people demonstrated their vim in the many faceted Azalea Festival of 1956. There were few, either young, old, men, women or youngsters, who didn't do their bit and who didn't appreciate the bits done by others. Writing, editorially, for a rather remote community to put on a program of features so widely diversified as our past festival is something of which we can all be proud and a prod for even better shows with more and more of our neighbors taking part. To many of them, it was their first local experience, and now that they have gotten the hang of it, they too will be figuring where they can fit in, next year.

Centering about our beautiful Azalea Park, the whole weekend carried out the scheme of beauty and the park itself—and Harris Beach Park as well—could not have been attractive without the loving and arduous care of the park-keepers, not only just for the Festival but for the rest of the year. Interviewed after the principal events that took place in their areas, they said this year the public was much more cooperative in not scattering their litter about. Again, editorially, we should all remember, when carelessly scattering trash in the parks, how we would like to help gather it up again, no matter how repulsive it is, even if we are getting paid for it. Our parks are not for our own private use but for the use of all.

This writer was more about the flower show than elsewhere. The season did not entirely favor many of the gardeners and thereby limited the floral field, such as were shown were well worth looking at. While some may not like the rules needed for truly competitive showings or did not heed them in the programs, the rules are necessary to level off competition onto a common understandable basis, and in future exhibitors are urged to conform. A vast improvement, this year, was in a better display of horticultural specimens. They were spread out so people could see them. However, there was a definite need for the proper naming of the specimens. Many visitors were heard to ask the name of a certain flower or plant, or the name of a rose and were inclined to handle the entry tags, which in themselves, weren't always a help.

In this respect a word might be handy here on the method of judging. Judging anything is an art, and those who judge our flower shows have undergone extensive training and study in

order that they may come up with facts and not fancies. Each specimen's virtues and values must be scientifically determined and graded.

In the appended list of awards will be found what the judges came up with. It will be noted that awards went to seemingly a very few gardeners. The reason for this is that the ribbon winners paid attention to the requirements and happened to have subjects in the various classifications. There were some very striking arrangements and which were, undoubtedly, quite instructive in the art of adaptation of nature's beauties to other than natural surroundings.

The outstanding feature of the 1956 Azalea Garden Club Flower Show will ever be that the show was staged by a lady with a broken arm. Mrs. Weideman couldn't have done better if she would have had both arms, she says, because she had such wonderful cooperation, for which she is appreciative.

Three prizes were donated by Mr. Wimberly of the Brookside Azalea Gardens and these were awarded sweepstakes winners. A large potted Hydrangea was given to the exhibitor winning the most blue ribbons in the Horticultural Sections and one to the exhibitor with the most blue ribbons in the Arrangement Section and a beautiful planter box went to the exhibitor with the most blue ribbons in the entire show.

Mrs. C. L. Fallert won the prize in the Arrangement Section, although two other exhibitors had as many blue ribbons as she; she had several second and fourth place ribbons which brought her to the front.

Mrs. Ed Ravekes walked off with the prize for the most blue ribbons in the Horticultural Section and also with the grand sweepstakes prize, for having won 19 ribbons. Mr. William Weideman was runner-up for sweepstakes in the Horticultural Section with six blue ribbons and twelve red ribbons and Mrs. Ravekes generously decided that he should have one of the hydrangeas since she had also won the planter box.

The door prizes given to visitors to the show by the Ortho representative who was showing wonderful pictures, were won by the following lucky people: Mrs. E. J. Munro, Crescent City; Bert Carlson, Harbor; Janet Tantare, Brookings; Dorothy Simpson, of Brookings; J. A. Hall, Myron Becker and Elna Sund, all of Brookings.
