

**THESE PEOPLE LIVE HERE . . .**

**HEWITT'S ANCHORAGE**— is what used to be the old Parker's Store at the North end of the Chetco Bridge, only every thing is different. The old store building has been torn down and a new one erected in its place since John and Frances Hewitt bought it in April of 1952. Last year they added a modern 2-bedroom apartment over the store.

Hewitt has had to build the new docks twice. Last winter's flood washed away his first docks but he has replaced them. The Hewitts were away on vacation when the flood came and they can't say enough in appreciation of the people who stepped in and saved their boats. They expected to find everything gone upon their delayed return but thanks to the good neighbors the docks is all that they lost.

In the new store they have added considerable space. Now they have a complete sporting goods section with fishing tackle guns and ammunition. They also have a sandwich bar for the accommodation of the fishermen.

The Hewitts came here from Napa, California, where he had engaged in commercial fishing for 4 years. He had also worked considerable in construction. They enjoy the newly completed apartment especially the sweeping view of the mouth of the Chetco River. They have 2 children, ages 1 and 4 years old.

At that time Shoemaker left the city police force, where he had served for 11 months, in order to devote full time to the restaurant.

The Shoemakers came here from Boise, Idaho in January of 1955. He had just retired from the service after 20 years with the Armored Cavalry. He had last been stationed as an instructor at the ROTC unit at the university of Idaho.

**251 In County Get Social Security**

Old-age benefits under Federal social security were awarded to more than 2,500 of the nation's newly retired workers a day during 1955. In Curry County alone, 40 more retired workers were receiving old-age monthly benefits at the end of 1955 than at the beginning of the year, according to figures just released by Carlos L. Hunsinger, district manager in Eureka.

At the end of 1955 251 retired workers in Curry County were getting monthly old-age benefits in addition, 184 people in this county were receiving monthly benefits as dependents of old-age beneficiaries or as survivors of workers who had died.

In Curry County, retired workers were receiving \$14,928 per month in social security payments as 1955 came to a close, Hunsinger said. Dependents of old-age beneficiaries or survivors of workers who had died were getting \$7,074 a month in Curry County at the end of the year. This is a total of \$22,002 a month, which is an increase of 27 per cent over the amount being paid at the end of 1954.

**COYOTE DAM** — Work is scheduled to begin, this month, on a huge flood control irrigation project, four miles north of Ukiah, known as the Coyote Dam. The structure will be of earth, 163 feet high and 3,500 feet long. The contract, won by The Guy F. Atkinson Co. of South San Francisco, for \$7,467,750.10 carries an additional bid of \$319,530 for the flood control gates.

The contract calls for the moving of some 6 million yards of earth, 9 million of rock and fill, and will require 1400 tons of steel, several million tons of concrete, and the removal of much material in the area which will be eventually covered with the 70,000 acre feet of water.

The contract calls for completion within 900 working days.
