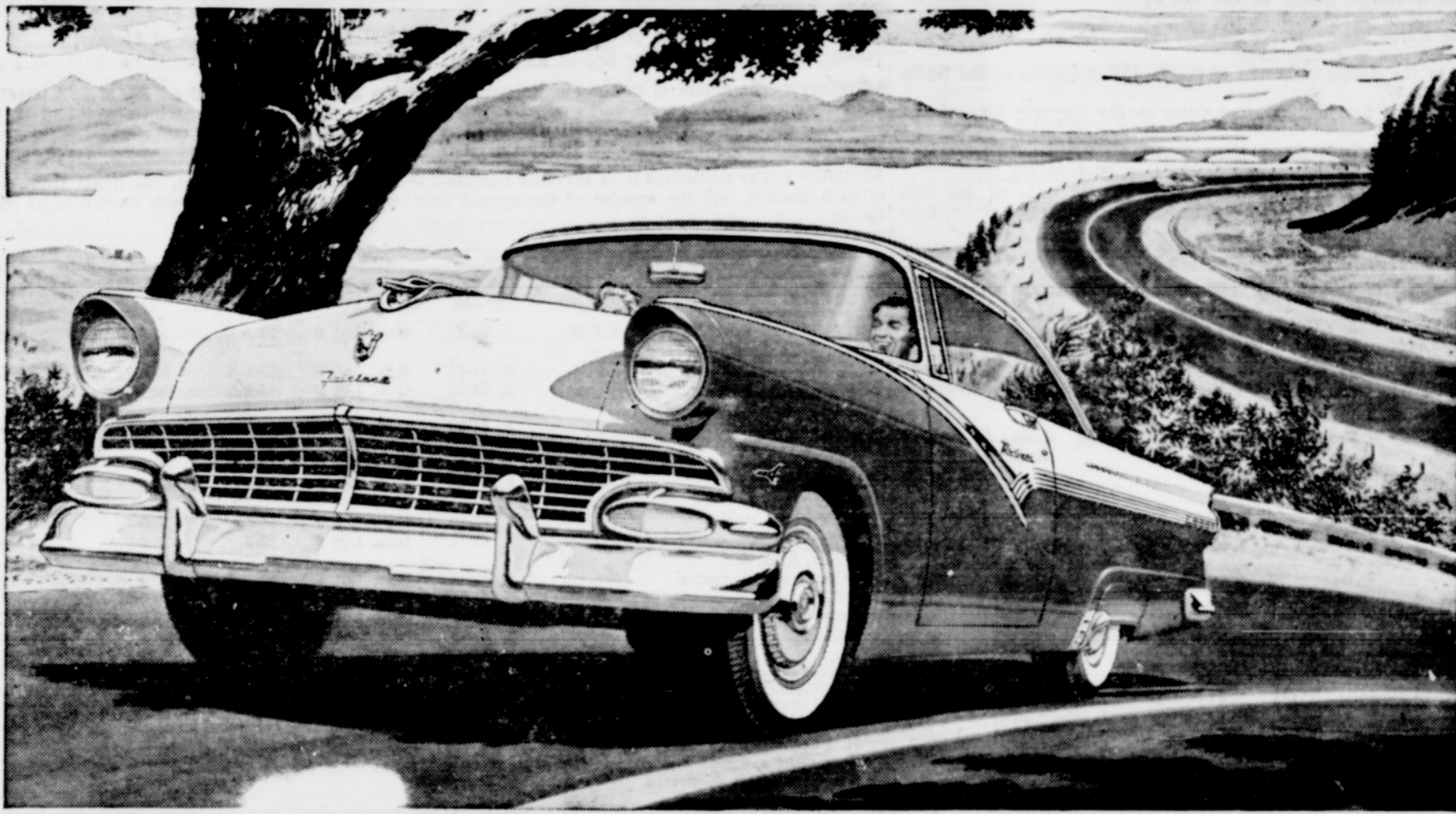
**FREAK DAHLIA? ? ?**

## Pre-School Exams Urged for School

The state board of health Thursday urged parents to obtain complete physical and dental examinations as soon as possible for all children entering school for the first time this fall. Dr. Harold M. Erickson, state health officer, said that Oregon school authorities ask parents for records of such medical and dental examinations at the time children first register. Examinations should be obtained early to allow time to complete immunization schedules and any corrective work which is indicated, Dr. Erickson said. He also reminded parents that many school districts require copies of birth certificates for all new admissions. These copies may be obtained by writing or visiting the state board of health, room 979, Portland state office building. One dollar should accompany the request for each copy. Information should include the full names of the child and the parents, and the date and place of birth, to enable state board of health staff members to search the records.

## FOR WHAT IT'S WORTH

How times have changed!  
A few years ago I read in the paper where the nation's teachers assembled in Portland in national convention had passed a resolution asking for higher pay, an hour of rest during the school day in addition to the lunch hour, tightening of restrictions for teacher certification and further went on record as opposed to having their salaries based on merit. As the battle-scarred veteran of public school teaching during the depression years, I was struck by the manner in which the picture has changed. In those days which were cursed or blessed by a teacher surplus, members of the profession were more concerned with getting a job and holding it than they were with salaries. In fact, so desperate was the situation that unemployed teachers were offering to teach for less money than those employed in order to get their jobs. As can readily be seen, in those days those who were doing the hiring had teachers over a barrel. If a hungry teacher dared to ask for a raise he was quickly made aware of the fact that he had no other place to go and that he had better be satisfied that he had a job. Consequently requests were few and far between. Today the shoe is on the other foot. With a scarcity of teachers and the influx of students into the public schools increasing a-lardingly, the teacher rather than the school board is now naming the tune. And it is the latter condition which gives me cause for worry; for I am firmly convinced that a balance of power is more to be desired than to have one faction in complete control. Any extreme is bound sooner or later to reach the bursting point and the reaction could do much harm to education. In the final analysis, the taxpayer is the one who makes the decision, and the tragic part of it is that the taxpayer is too often more interested in his pocketbook than in using good judgement. For that reason alone I would urge the teachers to use caution in their demands. With each passing election, those who pay the taxes are becoming more resistant; and history shows that when times get tough, those who are supported from tax revenue are the first to get it in the neck.
