"Fourteen", was all Mrs. Bailey had time to say before they were out the door ready to go fishing. I'm certain. A study of the road map helped another visitor plan a trip across the mountains to Medford. An unusual request came from a lady who wanted a piece of blackberry pie. Phone calls to the bakery and the local eating place left the visitor still searching.

Building Puts City in Uproar

The wheels of progress are grinding all over Brookings. Dozens and dozens of work men, and many huge pieces of equipment are methodically tearing up the city ripping out the old, and putting in the new.

The big highway 101 construction job, costing the state and federal government over \$200,000 is in full swing and huge cats are grading down the road edges, in preparation for making a four lane highway. Further out, work has been progressing for some weeks on Ransom Creek where state highway men will bridge over, in an attempt to cut off the rugged "Anderson" curve.

Further in, the Busch-Copenhagen firm is hard at work on the first sewer line to be constructed by the city, in district two. Currently the line has gone around Memory Lane, and most of Del Norte is complete.

Work superintendent for the form, Glen Bridwell figures that they will be at it for a month or more, although they are averaging about 500 feet a day.

Private construction too, is at an all time peak. Work is nearly finished on the Leonard building, being constructed by Don Horton. Horton and Sons are putting the finishing touches on the Cate building in North Brookings. They are due to start Monday on a new structure across the street, adjacent to Dunning Motors, which will be the new Chevrolet Agency. Also work is progressing on the Presbyterian church, building also being built by Horton and Sons.
