NEW BRIDGE COMPLETED

The new Forest Service bridge across Hurdy Gurdy creek up the south fork of Smith River has been completed and put in service. The bridge took several months to build and will aid in access to some 40 to 50 million feet of stumpage, soon to be offered for bids, within the federal forest lands. The cut will be on a sustained yield basis. Together with the new bridge now under construction across the main stream, and close to the junction of the south bank road and highway 199, the new Hurdy Gurdy bridge will make trucking out of the logs much easier.

Before completion of the new south fork road all materials had to be hauled over the old Humboldt Flat route.

Twenty-eight were killed and 40 injured during June in Oregon traffic accidents, including the 17 berry pickers hurt when their bus overturned.

DEL NORTE NEWS

A. K. Wilson, who figured in several timber deals around the area of northwestern California a few years back, has been found guilty of serious discrepancies in withholding tax contributions, according to word from San Francisco. Judge Goodman, after an eight day trial, handed down a judgement that could result in 33 years imprisonment and a \$60,000 fine, but, according to reports, Wilson is appealing the case.

A great deal of trouble is being experienced with beach fires, along the Del Norte coast.
