

### Susan Benham Passes August 19

Susan, widow of the late C. M. Benham, died at Tanglewood Home, Bandon, Sunday, August 19, 1956, in her 94th year.

"Aunt Sue," as she was affectionately called by old and young around here, for many, many years, was the widow of the late C. M. Benham, sometime local justice of the peace and postmaster, who died several years

ago. With her passing goes another of those rare good neighbors always ready, willing, and capable of meeting every situation, regardless of weather or any other condition. "Aunt Sue" was a seemingly indefatigable worker, whether or no there was any remuneration, and her hands fitted equally well a baby's first band or the handles of a wheelhoe. Her feet were almost as lively, on the dance floor, when she was well past her ninetieth milestone as they were when she first matched them to the rhythms back in her Missouri girlhood. She was

born back there on January 8, 1863.

We shall all miss "Aunt Sue," each in their own way, and as a community. But we know "Aunt Sue" in her wisdom, familiar with both the beginning and ending of all earthly things, looking back over the long trail she had travelled, realized that it was time she rejoined her friends, and resigned herself to the inevitable of her own passing over. We who knew her, feel she was happily resigned to the prayer of, "Thy Will Be Done," and passed on.

Locally she is survived by her

neice, Mrs. Milton DeMartin, and many other kin in the east.

Funeral services were conducted in Wier's Mortuary, Crescent City, Wednesday afternoon, with graveside services in the Wm. J. Ward Memorial Cemetery, Brookings.

### VFW Officials Visit BROOKINGS POST

State Junior Vice Commander Harry Birch and Mrs. Birch, of Medford, Inspector Dan Krotz, of Sandy Cove, and Adjutant Ernest Braung, of Medford, were visitors at last Wednesday night's meeting of the VFW Post and Auxiliary. Mrs. Braung and Mrs.

Birch attended the ladies' meeting.

Birch, who owns the Crater Supply Co., Medford, made a considerable name for himself in raising nearly \$50,000 for an Oregon Cottage at the National VFW children's home, at Eaton Rapids, Michigan, work on which, has already been started.

In his brief address he complemented the post and auxiliary on its membership and attendance and commented that there would probably be an increase in veterans' attention to organized groups as they became older and should there be a recession from the current high economic level. Krotz found the local post in excellent condition, according to its records, and inquired about the

Walking Blood Bank plans which, he stated, were being closely watched in other communities.

### Consolidated Joins N. A. Van Lines

Peter Basich, Consolidated Freightways manager at Brookings, today announced his company's affiliation with North American Van Lines as their moving agent here.

The new moving and storage service will offer local and long distance moving in addition to the existing service through Consolidated's own moving van division, Basich said.

Basich started with Consolidated in 1949 as station clerk at Tacoma. He transferred to Brookings as manager in April of this year. When construction started on the company's new terminal here. Now in operation, it serves a number of communities in the southern Oregon coastal area.

As agents for North American Van Lines, Inc., Consolidated will now supply moving van service locally and to 48 states, Canada, Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico, as well as to overseas points. At present North American is operating a fleet of 1500 modern vans and offers storage facilities in all principal cities.

Descriptive literature and estimates will be furnished without cost or obligation to anyone inquiring at Consolidated, Basich said.

### BLOOD TYPING PLANS PROGRESS

Plans for a repetition of free blood typing are going forward. New advances in the method are being thoroughly looked into by Mrs. Dorothea Miller, county health nurse, in hopes that its several phases will be coordinated so as to make the program run most smoothly.

It is contemplated to include residents of Smith River along with those between Carpenterville and the State Line, the area previously set up. Initial plans are for the typing of some 3,000 people from which a much increased donor list may be built. Currently the donor list is too limited and time consuming.

As before, it is planned to type all comers, from tiny infants to oldsters, each being supplied with pocket card bearing their name, blood type and address. In many instances this identification card has been of untold value when its data was used in checking for transfusions.

### NEW PRIEST

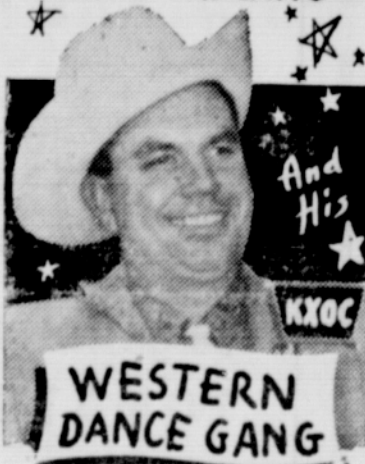

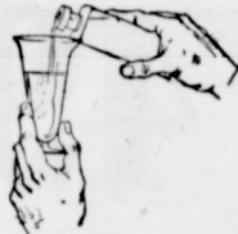
