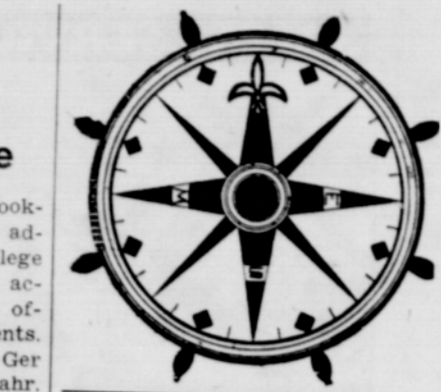
Walking Blood Bank Begins Enrollments; Vo'unteers Needed

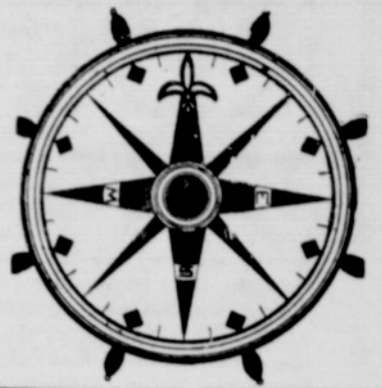
The hours are:

WORK STARTS ON OFFICES

Construction has started on the school district administrative building. Bids were let on the structure last Thursday with Horton Bros. being the low bidder with a bid of \$7,580.

The unit will be frame construction, with brick veneer and will include a vault for school records. The building will be attached to the present elementary building and will be 26 ft by 26 ft. Footings have already been poured. The unit will house the school district clerk's office and the office of the district superintendent. The high school administration will take over the existing offices. Also it is planned that one of the present offices will be used by a boy and girl advisor, to set up a guidance program here. Completion of the new unit is planned for October 10.

Approximately forty home owners in the district more commonly known as Sewer District No. 1 went on record as stating that they were in effect the rightful owners of the much disputed sewer system, otherwise claimed by Elmer Bankus.

A petition presented to the Mayor and Common Council Tuesday night said in part: "That the sewer system in the dedicated streets and alleys of said Town of Brookings, was constructed and laid prior to the date of publication, filing and recording of the public dedication of said Town of Brookings more than thirty years ago and that the undersigned, a owners of said respective lots are now by operation of law the legal owners of the said sewer system extending along, through, across, and serving their respective properties, and are now by operation of law the legal owners of easements in said sewer system.

The council took no immediate action on the new development but rather stuck by their original plan set forth in their May 10, 1955 council meeting by which the entire council went on record as stating they would purchase the sewer from Bankus for the appraisal price of \$29,044.66.

William Baldere, city attorney, reported progress in that direction is rapidly taking place. He spent the week end conferring with Bankus' attorney and another meeting is scheduled before the 25th of this month.

Mr. Baldere also urged the petition signers to bring about prompt litigation of this matter if they so desire.

Progress Made On Mail Delivery

Progress is being made on the house to house mail delivery, scheduled for Brookings, according to Postmaster Bill Thompson. Thompson has already the approval to go ahead with the route formation. He has projected the proposed route on several city maps, and will contact individual residents within the near future on the exact placement of the boxes.

About 400 homes would be served by the carrier, who will drive the route in his car. The carrier will be Ferdie Steinmetz, who is presently handling the rural route.

One of the holdups is that an easement is necessary between 7th and Pioneer on Hasset street, so the carrier won't have to back track his route. The city is negotiating on the easement.

Three Injured In Accident

A smash up Sunday afternoon threw three Brookings people in the hospital, and totally wrecked a new car owned by Ed Dempsey. The accident occurred just on the California side of the state line, directly in front of Dr. Chalmers place, at about 5 p.m. Sunday.

Injured were Mr. and Mrs. Tiny Drake and their son, David, 21, who is home from the navy on leave. Drake is co-operator of the Brookings Independent Auto Repair, is a bowling enthusiast and helps operate the hardtop races in Crescent City. The Drakes were just returning from the Hard Top races Sunday when the accident happened.

Mrs. Drake was the most seriously injured, suffering a concussion, compound fracture of the left leg, and general cuts and bruises. Mr. Drake received head concussions, a pinched neck nerve, and many bruises and cuts. David received only cuts and bruises. All were taken to Crescent City Seaside hospital.

Drake was driving Ed Dempsey's personal car, a new 1956 Dodge, with only 11,000 miles on it. The car was being used to drive race officials and others before the races began.

Witness Clarence Hoye reported that a Pontiac, driven by Jack Luttrell, Smith River, was going south while the Drake car was going north towards Brookings. The Pontiac apparently hit the road shoulder, and veered off losing control and entering into the path of Drake's Dodge.

The occupants of the Pontiac weren't hurt, and that car received very little damage—only a fender and headlight were smashed.

SCRIMMAGE SATURDAY

A full game scrimmage, beginning Saturday at 1 p.m., on the Banks field will give Coach Doug MacFarlane a chance to see better what he does have in the way of football players. The season opens next week with a strong Powers team visiting here Friday.

Coach MacFarlane has had his work cut out for him, with only a few weeks practice, in trying to field a team this year. Many of the boys out have had no prior football experience. The scrimmage Saturday should tell the staff a little more about what they do have.

A welcome addition to the team was Ron McCabe, halfback who recently transferred from Heppner to Brookings. He has had experience. Another transfer, Lane from Gold Beach, is slated for quarterback duties. Also working in

The culmination of over 20 years of work comes up to the voters Friday, September 14, when an election will be held on whether or not the Port of Brookings will be formed.

Voters in four precincts will go to the polls to decide on the formation of the district. In the Ferrello precinct the polls will be at the Leslie Miller's home, just about a mile up the North Bank Chetco road.

Brookings precinct No. 1, between Chetco Ave. and the ocean will vote in the L.O.O.F. hall, while Brookings precinct No. 2, residents on the north and east side of Chetco Ave. will vote in the V.F.-W. hall. The Chetco precinct will vote at the Grange hall.

Polls will open at 8 a.m. and continue until 8 p.m. The district to be formed includes most of the area from the California state line to slightly below Carpenterville.

If the measure passes within ten days Gov. Elmo Smith will appoint five commissioners, who will administer the Port. Two will serve until the November election, when they will be up for re-election. The other three will serve until November 1958. After that time they will serve four year terms as elected.

Proponents of the Port District maintain that it is vitally important to set up the district in order to have a group to handle the \$225,000 which has already been appropriated by the government for the development of the Port.

The money already appropriated will be used in completing engineering, building a jetty at the river mouth, and in some dredging work. The engineers have already spent considerable time at the river making soundings and the like.

Take out petitions for Mayor, Council

The political pot of Brookings is beginning to come to a boil. Petitions were taken out for a new candidate for Mayor, and two councilmen, while other men were considering running.

A petition was taken out for Bill Spencer for mayor, which will undoubtedly mean that there will be a contest for that post. A petition for councilman Fell Campbell for mayor was taken out earlier. The filing deadline is October 6, just three weeks away.

Also petitions were taken out for two councilmen, Percy Hanks, presently on the planning com-

mission, and Ben Phetteplace, owner of the Dairy Cream restaurant.

A new mayor will be elected this fall to replace Roy Brinn, who is running for county commissioner. Also councilmen will be needed to replace Clive Manley, whose term is up and who has signified no intention to return to the council. Fell Campbell's position will also be vacant, and a third member, Jim Yelton's council position will be up for grabs. Yelton hasn't signified his intentions as yet. The fourth councilman, Earl Breuer, has two years remaining of his term.
