Freightways Plan New Services

Motor freight transportation to the Brookings area will enter a new era of "super service" as a result of completion of the world's biggest motor freight terminal at Portland.

The new terminal, a \$500,000 ad-

dition to existing facilities operated by Consolidated Freightways, will mean stepped-up service for Brookings and points served out of Brookings, according to Peter Basich, manager of CF's terminal here.

Use of special freight-handling equipment, including a 1700-foot long overhead conveyor line, plus many unique design features will make it possible for shipments to move across the dock with a minimum of congestion and a maximum of speed, safety and accuracy in order to permit freight schedules to Brookings and other areas to clear on time, Basich pointed out.

"Every detail of the new terminal has been planned with an eye to improving service to our customers," Basich said. "It will enable CF to handle the tremendous volume of freight that crosses our dock every day with an absolute minimum of waste motion."
