Enrollment in the Brookings-Harbor school district has shown a good substantial increase, but leveled off from the terrific upsurge in recent years.

Supt. of Schools D. D. Williams reported that 641 children are enrolled in the elementary school, 160 in grades 7 and 8, and 265 in the high school for a total of 1066, 58 more than entered last year, and 96 more than were here a year ago.

The rate of increase, however, is only 6 percent, compared with 14 percent increase in the years immediately preceding. The major gain came in the high school, where 44 seniors graduated last spring, and 85 freshmen came in this year.

Grade 1 was down from 130 last year to only 103 this year.

Enrollment by grades: Grade 1, 103; grade 2, 133; grade 3, 109; grade 4, 114; grade 5, 94; grade 6, 88; grade 7, 76; grade 8, 84; grade 9, 85; grade 10, 72; grade 11, 60; and grade 12, 48.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Sir:
Your editorial of September 6 entitled "We Object - Vigorously" based upon a story you read in another paper, draws unwarranted conclusions.

The directors of Coos-Curry Electric Cooperative, Inc. are drawn from both parties and differ sharply on most candidates. They have one common purpose, however, and that is to keep electricity flowing to our 5000 members. In the course of fighting for adequate power, adequate lines to bring it to us, and reasonable rates to make it useable for everyone, the directors have to have sympathetic consideration in Congress, regardless of politics. All felt it their duty to let the membership know the reason that prompted them, regardless of party, to support one particular candidate in this election. Please note that we did not endorse a party.

I cannot understand the accusation of "hauling around of Democratic candidates - using our funds". In the past we have occasionally invited and sponsored governmental officials of both parties to dedications and annual meetings, but have carefully refrained from any expenditures for candidates or political purposes. In fact, we did not use either a Cooperative employee or even use Cooperative paper to prepare the resolution to which you object. As the elected and only members of the Cooperative who face the daily problems we meet in keeping our electric system operating, we felt it our duty to report our own personal experience. We do not feel that we are deprived of the right to express ourselves or to fight to maintain the system we were elected to manage.
