Bruins Beat Powers, 8 to 7

No sweeter victory could ever be topped by the win posted Friday when the Brookings-Harbor Bruins won their first football game. The score was 8 to 7 over Powers High. A story book finish marked this inaugural game for the hometowners. With just about a minute of playing time left the Bruins cashed in for a Td and victory.

A crowd of about 1000 rooters cheered the team on and was well rewarded with some very good football. This victory was a fine tribute to the coaching staff, who had little time in preparing the boys in the fundamentals of the game.

Brookings kicked off and after Powers failed to make any yardage the Bruins took over on the 44. Jerry Fox went for seven yards on the first play from scrimmage and then Ron McCabe picked up another yard or so for the first down. Stan Gribble picked up 13 yards for another first down and put the Bruins in threatening position. Jerry Fox carried again and drove to the 16 yard marker. Gribble picked up 4 more yards and Ronny Lane moved it to the 10. On three successive plays McCabe pounded the Powers line and picked up good yardage but banged into his own interference to be brought down on the 5.

Powers took over on downs and on the second play the hard charging B-H forward wall tackled Quarterback Dick McMahon in his own end zone for a safety and two points.

The first quarter ended after Brookings took the kick off from Power and ran two plays gaining little. The score Brookings 2; Powers 0.

In the early stages of the second quarter Brookings took to the air but did little damage to the Powers defense. After Brookings punted Powers took over on their own 40. Don Hess, junior halfback picked up 7 yards and Robert Frye added the necessary yardage for a first down. Again the Bruins charging forward wall set back Powers on two successive plays and the invaders were forced to punt.

Brookings put together a few good plays to net a couple of first forced downs but did not threaten any serious threat and they were enough of any consequence in the closing minutes of the first half.

Powers kicked off to start the second half. Another series of fine plays saw the Bruins rack up a couple of more first downs but not enough to cause any serious threat and they were forced to punt.

It was here that the Powers team started to show power Hess picked up 3 yards and Ken Smith picked up another 11 yards on two running plays. Another two plays failed to materialise and they punted out only to take over 4 downs later when Brookings failed to do anything and they too punted. "Punk" Smith, on three plays and the help of a Bruin penalty, moved the ball to the Brookings 38. Ron Woodring came up with one of the best runs of the afternoon when he scooted for 32 yards to the Brookings 5 yard line. He then went over on the next play

for a Powers touchdown. This put the Powers team out in front 6 to

2. They immediately scored the P. A. T. on a rushing play to make it 7 to 2.

Brookings' series of pay off plays started on their own 24. The Bruins took over when Jerry Anderson crashed through the Powers line and tackled Woodring for a two yard loss thus stopping a Powers drive.

With minutes ticking rapidly off the Brooks took to the air. Three Lane passes fell to the ground incomplete but he connected with Jerry Anderson, who took the pass on the 35 and ran it to the 40. A total of three rushing plays netted little and a 15 yard penalty put the Bruins in shadow of defeat. A key play, a pass Stan Gribble to David Moore brought the ball to the 6 yard line with less than two minutes to play Gribble moved the ball to the four on the next play

and then crashed over for the Td and 6 precious points. This put the Bruins ahead 8 to 7. Their try for the point after touchdown was no good. The gun went off and pandemonium set in as the hundreds of people rushed on to the field to congratulate players and coaches.

The team travels to Cave Junction for a Friday night game with the Illinois Valley team.

SALMON NEVER SO GOOD

According to News from the State Game Commission salmon anglers in Oregon never had it so good. Reports from all the angling streams are higher than ever known before.

At Winchester Bay, anglers took some 10,000 fish up to August 15th, and Coos Bay reports 20,995 anglers have landed 20,847 salmon, an increase of almost 300 anglers and some 9000 fish over the entire year of 1955, and there

remains three or four weeks of salmon angling there.

While no statistics have been received from Yaquina Bay, Depot Bay, Gold Beach, or other popular coastal streams, indications are that they, too, will far exceed last years sport catch.
