Surviving members of the World War I famed Wild West Division will gather at Seattle on September 29. Nearly 500 Get Blood Typed

Whole blood transfusions were brought much closer to the community through the recent typing program put on by the local VFW Post and Ladies Auxiliary. It is believed the donor list has been greatly added to and its use made much more valuable through locating people by their home address and phone numbers. Nearly 500 people were typed during the program. About one third of these were children and from the balance there were a few who, for one or another reason, would not be available for transfusions. These names added to the still resident list of donors made three years ago, should assure the medical profession of an adequate supply of whole blood when needed, as it frequently has

Now that the list has been compiled, serially, as people came in, others will transcribe data to file cards and these will be segregated according to individual characteristics and a donor list compiled. This list will be available at all times to the medical profession.

Further typing is not contemplated, immediately, by the sponsors. In fact, it may not be necessary for another three years, at least, at the end of which those past their fifteenth birthday who were typed will have, by then, become eligible as donors.

One former service man is reported to have been found with the wrong typing on his service records.

Those responsible for the program are very grateful for the response and really feel their many hours at the typing station were well spent.
