### REGISTRATION !

**CORRECTING AN ERROR IN LAST WEEK'S PAPER:** If your name was in the poll books at the last Primary election and you did not vote, YOU NEED NOT REGISTER.

In going over the voters' list of precincts No's 1 and 2 it would appear there are many who should check their registration. While the list at hand may not be accurate there are several discrepancies which may have already been taken care of by the voters. Included in these lists are citizens who are now residents of the Chetco or other precincts.

It is entirely up to the individual to assure themselves they are registered in their proper precinct. EVERY VOTER will be required to sign TWO poll books certifying their actual residence in the precinct to which they apply for a ballot. If their name is NOT in that precinct's poll books or they do not have a valid certificate from the county clerk authorizing them to vote in that precinct, they cannot get a ballot there. A heavy penalty is provided for those who falsify their residence.
