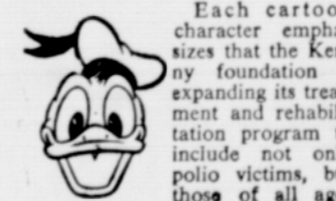

Kline, national executive director, declared. "It strives not only to help patients make physical adjustments, but attempts also the solution of problems concerning family, mental outlook, education and ability for gainful occupation."

"Because of its tremendous demands in terms of trained personnel, a program of this nature is extremely expensive and one that will require subsidization from the Kenny foundation which has no source of income other than public contributions."
