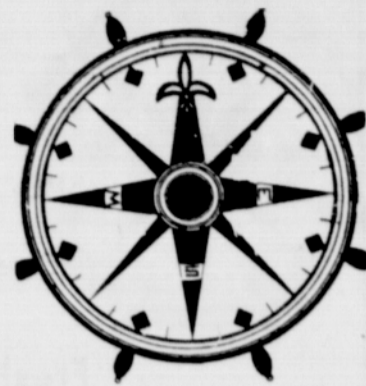

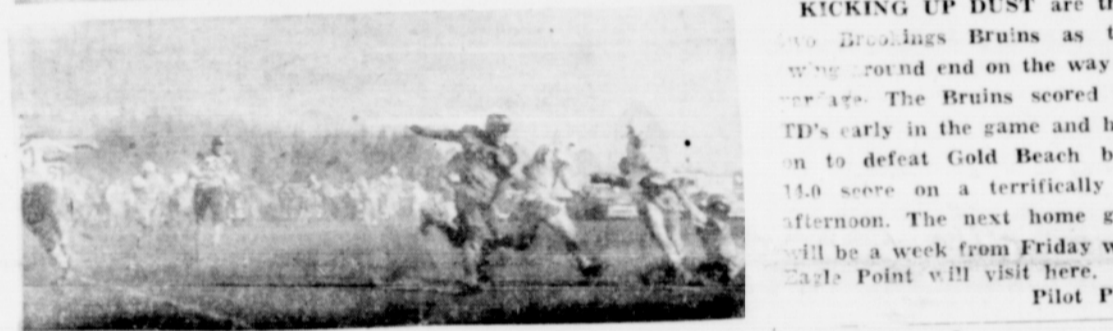
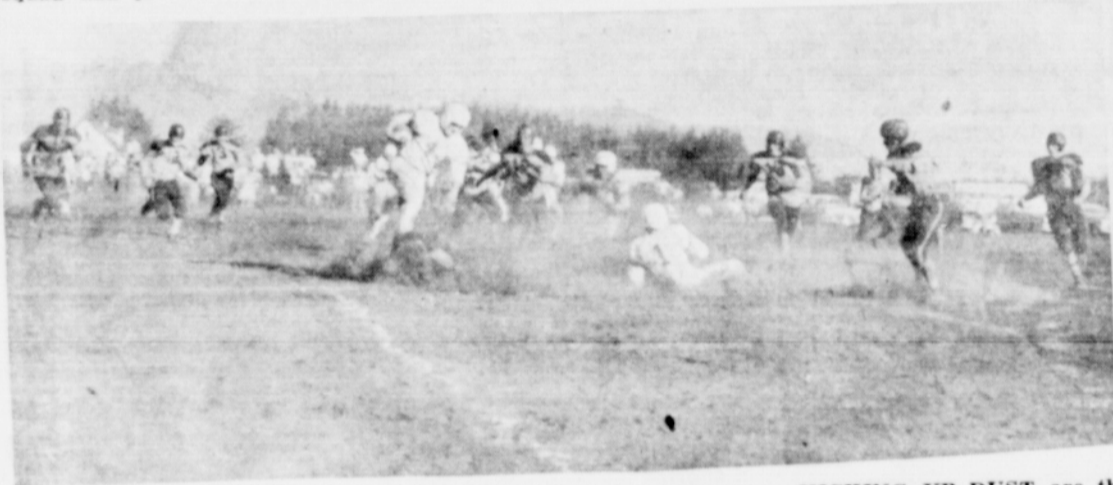

William Zickler died Sunday afternoon, after he suffered a heart attack. Zickler had been a bookkeeper at the sawmill of the Brookings Plywood for the past five years.

Funeral services were held on Wednesday at 2 p.m. in the Wiers Mortuary Chapel in Crescent City. He was interred in the Veterans cemetery in Crescent City.

Survivors include his wife, Elizabeth Eileen, Brookings; two daughters, Mrs. Robert Haynes, St. Louis, Mo. and Dean Taylor, West Covina, California, his mother, Mrs. Mary Rose, Orange, New Jersey, a brother, J. A. Zickler, Orange, New Jersey and one granddaughter.

Zickler was born in Organe, New Jersey. He served on the U. S. S. Illinois during World War I, and was a member of the American Legion.

Art Sherman Wins Freedom Tuesday

The case against County Surveyor Arthur Sherman, held for allegedly stealing timber was dismissed Tuesday on a motion made by the defendant with the approval of the state, due to the fact that the ownership of the timber in question was disputed.

Immediately following the disposition of the case Sherman turned his resignation as county surveyor into the Curry county court. Sherman was accused of taking timber off property in northern Curry county. However, it was brought out at the trial, held at the Circuit Court in Gold Beach, that the property lines are "vague" in the area in question, and that it appeared that three different people owned the timber.

Sherman was elected to office two years ago. His successor will be appointed by the county court, but some difficulty will occur there, as there is no licensed surveyor operating in the county.

Besides her husband, she is survived by two sisters, Mrs. J. H. Bellamy of San Gabriel, California and Mrs. Edith Virtue of East Orange, N. J.; two brothers, Albert Plutshock of Menominee, Wisconsin and Archie of Milwaukee, Wisconsin. She was a member of the local Emblem club.

Curry County Tax League is Set Up

A Curry County Tax Payers league was set up at a meeting Friday night by a group of interested citizens. Charles Grayshel was elected president of the group and Virgil Clark was named secretary-treasurer.

It was planned that three vice-presidents would be selected, one to represent the north portion of the county, one to represent the center, and a third for the south end. Also a director would be chosen for each of the three districts.

The group was to go ahead with drawing up incorporation papers this week. It was planned to sell memberships at \$1 each to tax payers and others in the entire county.

Five men, and three alternates were nominated for Port Commissioners for the Port of Brookings in two meetings this week. The five selected at a meeting of the Chetco River Mouth Committee were Vern Hanscom, Wilson Freeman, Dr. Roy White, Les Dimmick and Gunnar Hedberg. Selected as alternates were Warren McNeely, Karl Ostenberg and C. "Ed" Dempsey.

Tuesday night the Republican Central Committee gave their blessing to this list of nominees. Members of the committee reported that they would also attempt to get the approval of Curry County Judge Guy Forsyth and Mayor Roy Brimm for the nominees.

The five commissioners are to be appointed by Governor Elmo Smith, and it is believed by proponents that the governor will very likely act on the recommendations from the above groups and individuals. The appointments will probably be made within the next week.

The Port District was formed by an overwhelming majority several weeks ago. It includes an area from the state line to nearly Carpenterville.

Council Has Tuesday Meeting

The Brookings council held a quiet and short session Tuesday night. Several ordinances were passed, and several complaints were heard and acted upon.

Elmer Bankus of the Brookings Land and Townsite Co. appeared to protest the city's hooking of their recently constructed sewer onto the "old sewer system". A letter from his attorneys was read demanding that the sewer be disconnected from the manhole. The letter said that the connections were unauthorized.

Mayor Roy Brimm and city work superintendent Ralph Reed said that the city hadn't authorized the connections, but that it was in the contract with the Pelican Bay firm that the connections be made. However, they pointed out that no use had been made of the sewer and the firm had wanted to hook up only to test their pipes.

Bankus insisted that the city disconnect, and a motion was made and passed to have the contractor disconnect.

An ordinance No. 98 was passed which fixed the speed limit on alleys in the city to 10 miles an hour and limited parking to unloading only with a time limit of 45 minutes.

Joe Jacobs appeared to protest the treatment of his petition in the planning commission which tabled his request for re-zoning along highway 101. The council wrote a letter requesting the planning commission to hold another meeting on the subject with Jacobs present.

Petitions for Ben Phetteplace and Lee Hein for council were read. Earlier Percy Hank's petition had been filed bringing the total running for two vacancies to three.

George Murry protested a fence built on property that he recently sold which prevented his access to a garage. City attorney W. W. Baldersee advised the council that this was private property and as such was of no concern to the city.

Ordinance No. 99 was passed which changed three sections of an earlier ordinance regarding posting and sending of notices.

Warrants totaling about \$18,000 were issued to pay for work done on the three sewer districts. George McBride of the West Coast Telephone Co. appeared to ask the council to do something about the proposed ordinance which was read and sent to the PUC asking that the phone company establish an exchange here. Councilmen reported that District Attorney Ed Ackley had some names of complainants and they wanted to see them before taking any action.

The council agreed to rent equipment from Gary Wimberly instead of purchasing a new loader at this time.
