# The Facts

On the Reappraisal Program in Curry County

1. The authority to make a re-appraisal of all taxable, real property of all the counties in the state was delegated to the State Tax Commission by the State Legislature. Fifty per cent of the cost of this work was to be borne by the County and 50 per cent by the State.

2. In 1952, Curry County voted DOWN the reappraisal measure and would not authorize a tax levy. In 1954, the measure was put up to the voters again and was passed overwhelmingly. A tax levy was authorized extending over a period of six years. The first levy, \$8,600, was collected with the 1954-1955 taxes.

3. In 1955, after receipt of the levy, the County Court and the Assessor's office entered into an agreement with the State Tax Commission to reappraise all county property.

4. The County's contract with the State Tax Commission provides:

a. All Appraisals shall be completed in time for use in the 1959 Assessment Roll. The Assessor's Office agrees to use the new Valuations in the 1959 Assessment Roll.

b. All work is to be done under the direct control and supervision of the Tax Commission.

c. The County and the Assessor's Office agree to extend full cooperation to the Tax Commission.

d. The Assessor's Office agrees to furnish the Tax Commission all data necessary to complete the program.

5. A complete set of aerial photographs of the County was completed in September, 1955. Arrangements for this work were made by the County in cooperation with the Tax Commission, and the County paid the cost.

6. A letter from the State Tax Commission, dated September 27, 1955, states:

*"Curry County is the first County we have worked under the Reappraisal Program in which there will be no delay because of lack of photos."*

7. Prior to beginning actual field work on reappraisal of farm and timber properties, it was necessary to convert the aerial photos into maps. Complete copies of maps and tracings have been made in the Assessor's office, to conform to the scale desired by the Tax Commission. Tax Commission agents have been given copies of all ownership records and property descriptions.

*No accurate field work is possible until agents have these tools to work with.*

8. Actual field work on reappraisal of timber lands was begun by State Tax Commission agents early this month.

9. Reappraisal of business, manufacturing and residential properties has been kept up to date by the Assessor's office, under appraisal rules laid down by the Tax Commission, and under the laws of the State of Oregon.

10. The County Assessor and the Tax Commission have been working steadily on the reappraisal program since the program was voted in by the people.

This is a Big Program, requiring careful work and study.  
The Assessor's office has done its utmost to hasten completion.
