

**LUMBER MARKET**

According to Random Lights some slight advances in the lumber market seems to be set. tending down and there have been some slight advances in the prices on certain grades. Mixed

car shipments of green and kiln dried lumber are going forward while the pine market remains spotty.

Plywood seems to be firmed at \$87 basing price on 1/4 inch A. D. stock demand is brisk but there is still curtailed production.

(Continued from previous page) should be consolidated under a single administrative body designed to improve over-all management and make sales policy and procedure uniform; a state-wide road planning board should be set up; the proposed Federal Forest Corporation should finance and construct all roads into federally owned timber; the present trend toward reduction in the per cent O & C timber revenues which the O & C counties retain should be continued and a comprehensive study should be made on the effects of logging on municipal watersheds.

Much mill residue is inevitable as the result of cutting rectangular

boards from cylindrical logs of varying sizes, tapers, degrees of roundness, etc. and the chare shows that the Coos-Curry district alone was destroying some 200,000 dry tons of chippable material during 1953 and about 150,000 tons used for fuel with possible 35,000 tons going to "other uses".

Charts also show that about one third of the veneer trim in 1953 in Coos-Curry went for fuel. On the overall survey of Oregon's coarse residue from sawmills, green veneer trim and cores from veneer and plywood production in 1953 alone, some 1,999,000 tons dry weight of chippable wood was produced and an additional 1,123,000 tons of chippable residue burned as fuel.

Assuming only half of the unused residue alone were utilized by pulp mills, an additional thirteen mills of 120 tons of Kraft papers capacity per day could be established in Oregon and would employ some 1,700 people whose annual payroll would amount to \$7.7 million.

The report states that growth and importance of the large scale, fully integrated operation seems likely to constitute an important factor in the better utilization picture with the grouping of a number of plants for manufacture of diverse products on one mill site. Thus, a fully developed millsite may include a sawmill, plywood plant, pressed log plant, bark products plant, planing mill, pulp, mill, dry kiln and power plant. Important economies may be achieved by such grouping, one of the most important of which is economical transportation of heavy, bulky materials, which could then be done with conveyor systems.

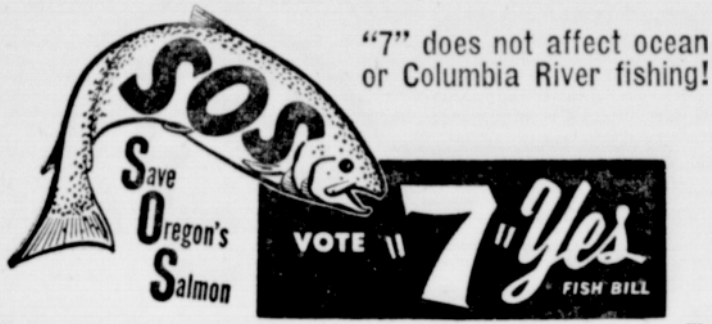

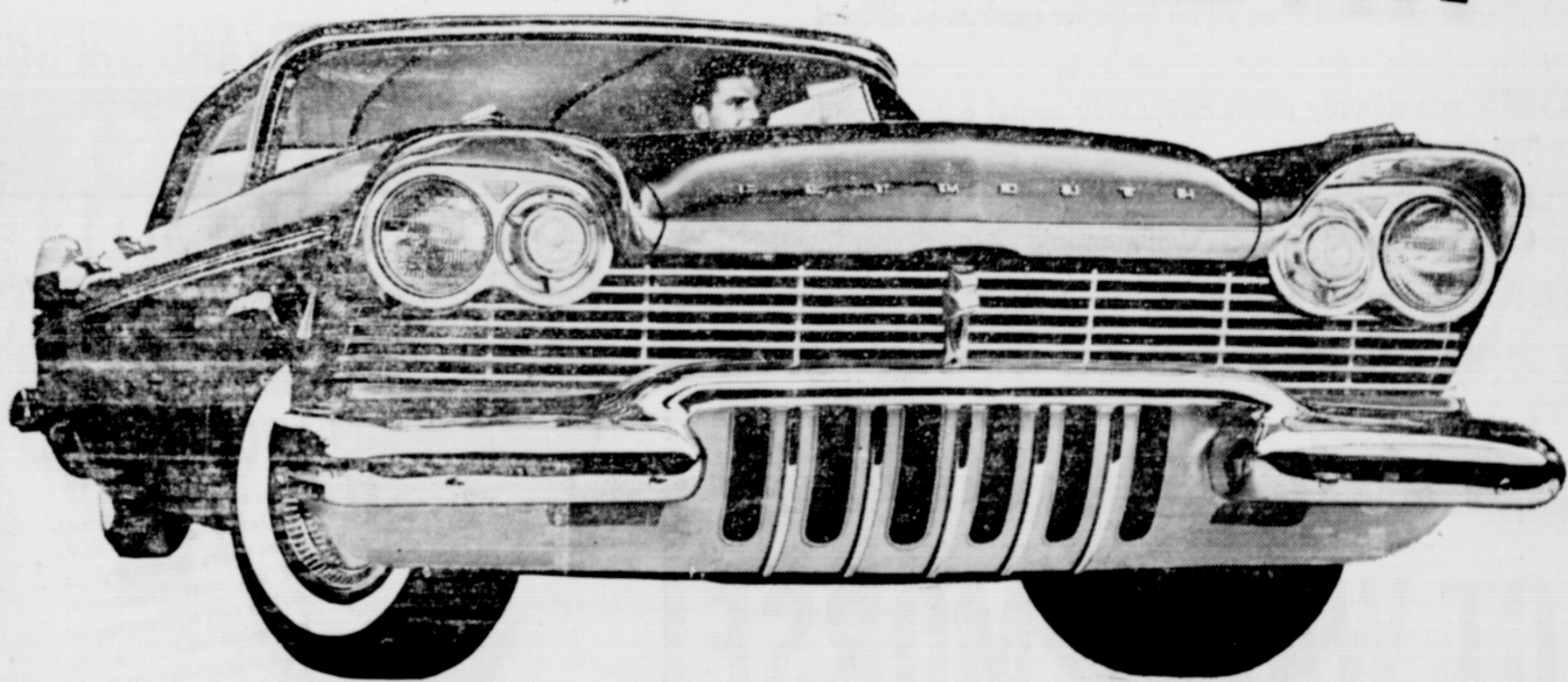
