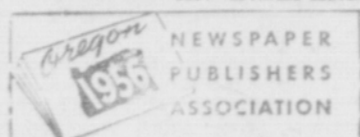

A STOP SIGN FOR CURRY COUNTY?

People of Curry county are inclined to be more than a little proud of their rugged isolationism. We are happy to tell our out of state friends that Curry county doesn't have a mile of railroad track, or a seaport in its confines.

We don't have a road that crosses the county from east to west. We live nearly 400 miles from any metropolitan center. There are a good many things that the "more civilized" people in the populated areas have that we lack. However, we are a rugged people in Curry county—and we're proud of it.

Nowhere in the county do we have a stop light—along the 100 mile length of our "Main street", highway 101. And here is where we cry for progress. we know they are right—that our children are being, unnecessarily subjected to risks by the lack of a safe highway crossing, in order to get to school. We know the highway bi-sects Brookings. We know several hundred youngsters are forced to cross the busy highway at least twice a day. We know that the school safety patrol is doing a wonderful job, and we know that the Brookings police force is doing everything in their power to prevent an accident.

But it is easy to see that we are, in effect, making that opportunity for accident easy. We would like to suggest that the city administration look very deeply into the purchase of a stop sign, probably of the over-hanging variety. One would probably do for now—just to give the youngsters a fighting chance to get across the highway. We know that stop signs cost money—but we know too that youngsters, your kid and ours are worth more than money.

The quality of any picture depends on the artist's ability to balance dark and light areas, create rhythm and combine colors. Various lines suggest different moods, the publication points out.

A picture doesn't have to be a masterpiece to be enjoyed, says author Myrtle Carter, OSC home furnishings specialist. In fact, faithful reproduction are much better than poor originals, she says. Mark of a good reproduction is one that shows every brush stroke of the original painting.

Ways to use pictures to fit in with different room scenes are included in the circular. Copies are available at county extension offices.
