A decision has been reached by Judge Samuel Finley, who issued a Memorandum for Judgement on Wednesday in favor of L. W. Johnson in the sum of \$5807.20 against Milton L. DeMartin and Khadra DeMartin as a result of a case in Del Norte Superior Court of last January charging fraud and failure to fulfill the stipulations of a real estate contract covering a

ranch on the Winchuck River.

Johnson was represented by Attorneys G. H. Van Harvey of San Francisco and L. I. Dodge of Crescent City. The firm of Degnan and Weller represented defendant DeMartin.

Christmas Recipe

DANISH KLYNER

- 2 whole eggs
- 6 egg yolks
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 tablespoons cream
- 1 tablespoon melted butter or margarine
- Grated rind of 1 lemon
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice
- 3 to 3 1/2 cups sifted enriched flour

Fat for deep frying
Confectioners' sugar
Beat eggs and egg yolks. Stir in sugar. Add cream, melted butter or margarine, lemon rind and juice, mixing until well blended. Add flour to make a soft dough. Chill. Roll out on lightly floured board or pastry cloth to 1/16 inch thickness. Cut into strips 1 x 3 inches, making a slit in the center of the strip. Pull one end of dough through slit. Fry in deep fat (375 degree F.) until a golden brown. Drain on absorbent paper. Dust with confectioners' sugar. Makes about 6 dozen Klyner.

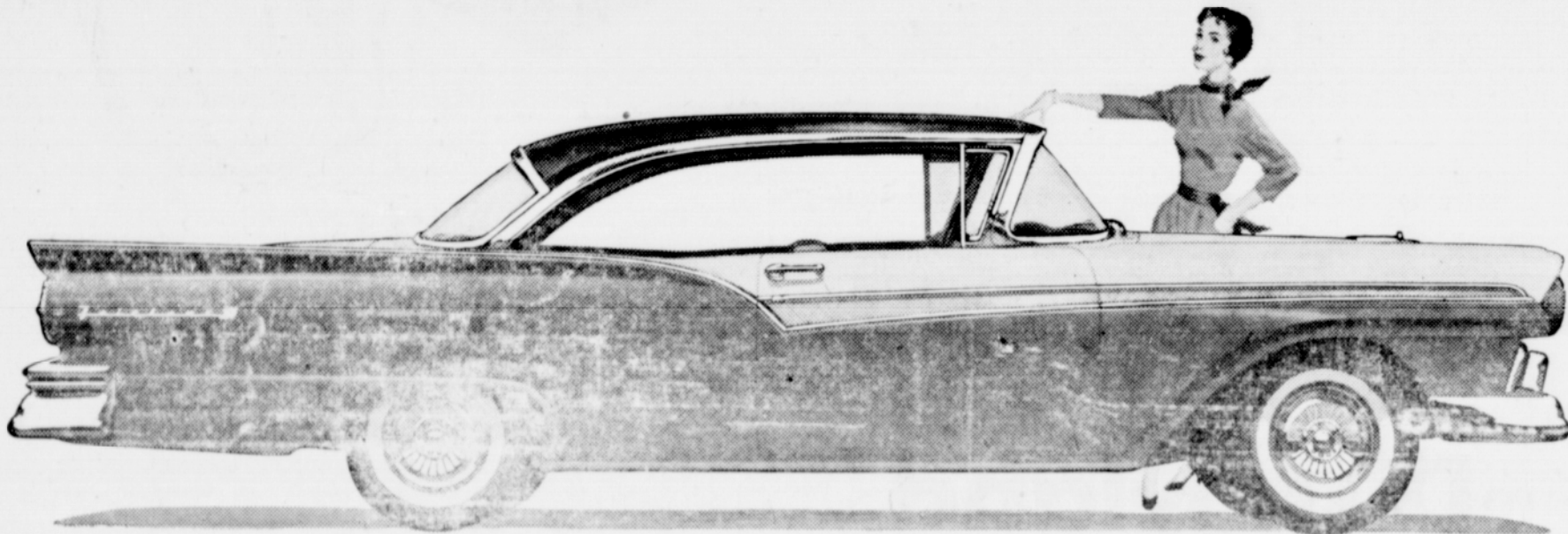
Remembering my younger days, I insisted the young man take my seat so's they could be together. He hesitated at first, then finally he shrugged, grinned

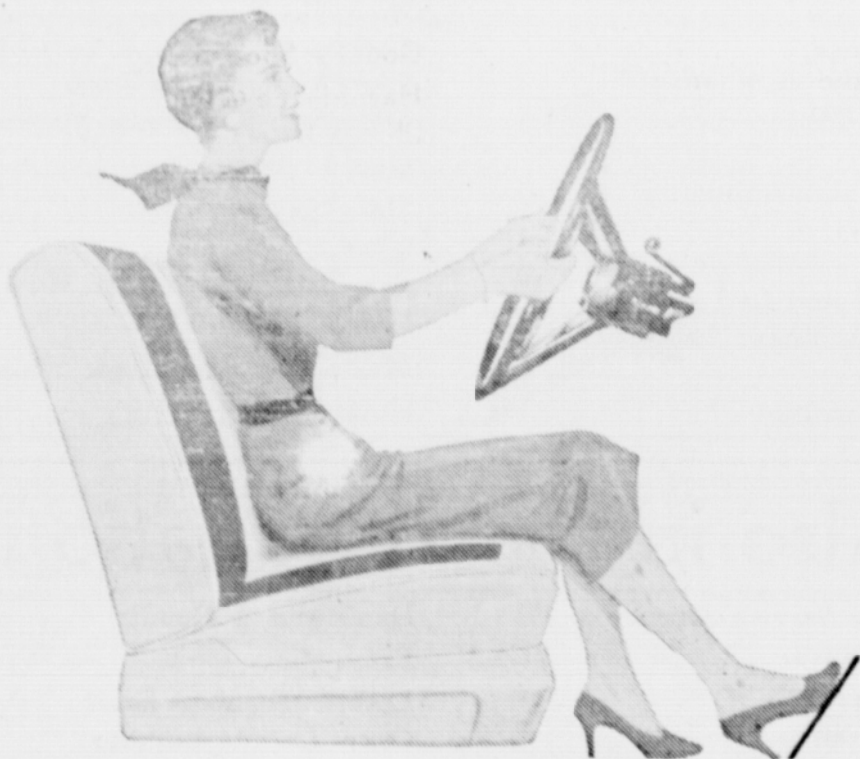
