

Ron Bullock Leads Scoring

Ron Bullock, tall Brookings Bruins center, has a narrow edge over Jerry Anderson, Ron Lane, and Marv Bullock for the individual scoring race for the Brookings high varsity basketball team. Although the first four boys are practically even-stein in the scoring, followed by Bill Workinger, and Stan Gribble, Ron Bullock has a slight edge with 59 points in the first eight Bruin contests. Second is Jerry Anderson with 56, followed by Marv Bullock with 52, and Lane with 51. Workinger has 44, Gribble 33, Jerry Fox 19, Harrison Hale 14, Gary Galambos 7, Ray Hansen 9, and Dave Western 2.

The Brooks haven't been a high scoring aggregation, piling in only 346 points in winning six out of eight games, for an average of a little better than 43 points per outing. However, defensively they have been outstanding, limiting

their opponents to a mere 37 points per game. Only one team, a big Eureka squad hit more than 40 points against the Bruins, when they racked up 56 in the season opener. Since that time only Del Norte managed to hit 40.

Brookings hit their high point against Rogue River at the Brookings gym, netting 61 points. The team has hit for 132 field goals, and 82 free throws, and have been charged with 109 fouls.

Individually, Ron Bullock is high in the field goal department, netting 25 buckets, while both Marv Bullock and Lane have hit for 19. Jerry Anderson, with 22 free throws, is far ahead in that category. Ron Bullock also leads in fouls, with 23 charged against him.

Special background study materials will be provided to all discussion groups. At the end of each discussion, individuals register their opinions through Great Decisions ballots. The results of these go to Congress and the State Department.

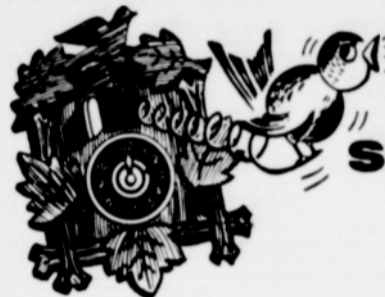
