

Two Jetties Proposed By Engineers

Tentative plans, presented by U. S. Army Engineers who were in Brookings Tuesday and Wednesday, called for the building of two jetties at the mouth of the Chetco. A map of the project showed the main jetty, on the south side or Harbor side would extend out approximately 900 feet. There would be an opening of about 260 feet between the jetties on the

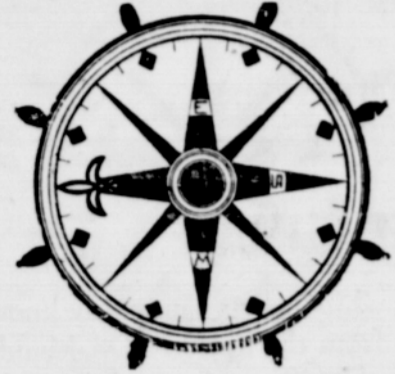
ocean end. The jetties would be constructed of local rock. Port Commissioners and the Engineers were quick to point out that the plans are only tentative, and have not received the final approval, although indications were that the project would be as planned. Three persons were in the party visiting Brookings this week,

an engineer, Mr. Roberts; a real estate appraiser, Mr. Stanley, and a surveyor. The Chetco River mouth committee had made certain commitments to the government in order to obtain the appropriation of \$225,000. These were to obtain access easements, and to provide, free of charge, a suitable quarry site for the rock necessary to build

the jetty. The Port commission now has passed a resolution at the request of the Army Engineers, signifying the commissions approval of the project, and confirming the commitments made previously. Roberts, the engineer from the Port Office of the Engineers inspected various quarry sites made available to the Engineers by the

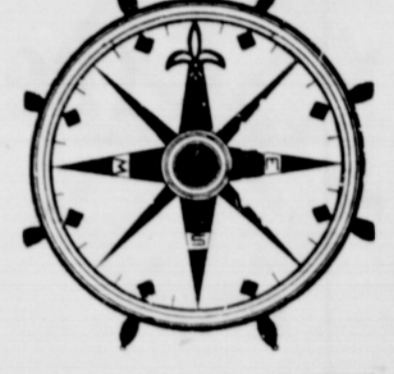
Port Commission, several potential sites were offered for approval, and were inspected as to volume and quality of construction material. In the evening the commission met with Stanley, an attorney for the Engineers, and listened to an explanation of the preliminary steps to be taken locally in order to get the project underway.

The engineers indicated that the original plans were unchanged in calling for bids. This is a call for bids in February, with the bids to be opened in March. At the meeting held Monday, the annual election of officers was held. Wilson Freeman was elected chairman, Karl Ostenberg, vice-president and Dr. Roy White, sec.

Jack Hagen appeared to ask that the speed limit in North Brookings be lowered to 25, but the council reported that the limit is set by the state and the city could do nothing to change it.

Building is High In Brookings

Building permits issued in Brookings reflected a leveling off of the previous high totals, although the building was still very high for a city of this size. A total of \$602,005 was issued by the city in building permits during 1956, just about one half of the peak of \$1,224,211 hit in 1955. However, although the actual building permits leveled off there was a great deal more other activity in the city which pushed the total work done a good deal higher than any previous year. The state highway added about \$250,000 to this total in the widening of highway 101 within the city limits. Also the work by the state highway on Pioneer and Easy totaled \$21,485. Three sewer construction jobs tallied up as follows: Area 2, \$48,254; Area 4, \$43,710; Area 7, \$30,098, a total in sewer construction of \$162,000. Total construction work within the city limits was: Sewer \$162,000 building, \$602,005 and highway construction, \$271,000 for a grand total of \$1,033,000.

Lillebo Construction Firm Wins Contract For Two Bridges Across Chetco River

The Tom Lillebo Construction Co., Reedsport, Ore. was awarded the contract for the construction of bridges across the Chetco River and the Upper Mill creek by the Bureau of Public Roads, according to a news story in the Daily Journal of Commerce. There was no indication on when the actual work would start with the contractor having an eye on the weather. However, the resident engineer of the Bureau of Public Roads, has arrived in Brookings and has set up an office. The contract also calls for the grading of a section of forest development road between the two bridges. The stretch of road to be graded is 0.854 miles. F. E. Andrews, division engineer of the Bureau of Public Roads made the award. Five other contracting firms submitted bids with the Inland Construction Co.
