Bruins Remain on Top

Winning their ninth game in eleven starts, the Brookings Bruins swept over Phoenix Friday night 45-39 to maintain a first place tie with Eagle Point in the Rogue River league. Eagle Point will be here Friday and Saturday this week in the most crucial test of the season for the strong Brookings aggregation.

Phoenix, annually a strong team, couldn't break thru a tight Brook defense in the first quarter. The Bruins racked up a big 12 to 3 first quarter lead and hung on to that margin practically to the end.

The first quarter showed Brookings stock in trade, good balanced scoring and good defensive play. Bill Workinger, Jerry Anderson, Ron Bullock and Ron Lane each made two points in the first frame while Marv Bullock contributed four points. In the meantime, all Phoenix could do was hit for a single basket and a free throw.

Brookings added 13 points in the second quarter, while Phoenix began to pick up a little steam, gathering ten points, so the Bruins lead by a comfortable 25-13 half time margin.

Twelve free throws for the Pirates in the third stanza boosted them to within six points at 35-29, but the Brooks held tough in the final period.

Ron Lane hit for a high total of 16 points, while Workinger added 12, Marv Bullock eight, and Ron Bullock six. Jim James led Phoenix with 13 counters.

Pace is fortunate in having a strong contingent of capable reserves in the fray too with Harrison Hale, Jerry Fox, Ray Hansen, Gary Galambos and Ron Western.

The Junior Varsity teams will begin play at 7 p.m. The Brookings JV squad, coached by Doug MacFarlane has a fine record to uphold too.

Heart Sunday Planned to Enroll 75 Volunteers in Area on February 24

Plans were completed this week for recruiting a task force of volunteers to knock at every door in the Brookings-Harbor area in a mass house-to-house collection for the 1957 Heart Fund on Heart Sunday, February 24.

C. Ed Dempsey, Heart Fund chairman, announced after the final planning meeting that 75 Brookings-Harbor women would be required to carry out the task. Volunteers for the Heart Sunday army may enroll at Heart Fund headquarters by telephoning Mrs. Dempsey at 2535.

Heart Sunday, marking a peak of the month-long drive, will be conducted this year in some 5,000 communities throughout the nation.

In Brookings and Harbor the door-to-door collection will be conducted from 1 to 5 p.m. on Heart Sunday with about 15 captains directing the activities of collectors. Women of Beta Sigma Phi, who have the Heart Drive as one of their major projects of the year were first to offer their services for Heart Sunday, and will act as captains of the various districts.

Each volunteer will call at about 15 homes, mostly those of his immediate neighbors. Mr. Dempsey explained. The volunteers will collect at each home a contribution to be sealed in a small manila envelope. Each volunteer will wear an authorized identification tag and will carry a supply of gift envelopes. Contributors need not indicate the amount of their gifts unless they desire a receipt for income tax purposes.

"Our volunteer army (as in previous years) will be made up of average citizens who want to serve the Heart Fund by contributing their time on one Sunday afternoon," Mr. Dempsey said. "We expect that a large portion of this Heart Sunday army will be enlisted from the women's

groups of the Brookings churches, and the auxiliaries of the lodge and service groups. Most heads of groups have been contacted this week and their willingness to take part is most gratifying," he added.

Curry County Chairman Arnold Peabody of the Brookings branch of the United States National Bank of Portland, who is also county treasurer of the Heart Fund, has indicated that the women employed by the bank have volunteered one hundred percent to again work as collectors February 24.

He reports that this area last year collected \$1,006.78, in spite of the heavy downpour with 40 workers braving the elements to do so. Curry county turned in a total of \$1,300.39 to top all counties of the State of Oregon on a per capita basis. Mr. George Dunning was Brookings chairman last year.

The heart and blood vessel diseases strike all communities in approximately the same degree, and they are no respecters of age. They cause more than 800,000 deaths in the nation every year. And one in each 16 Americans—or a total of 10,000,000—suffers from one or another of the diseases.

"Research requires a major portion of Heart Fund proceeds—for it is through research that we shall eventually discover the causes of heart disease and new ways to alleviate suffering and prolong life," Mr. Dempsey said. "This is why I am asking every resident of the area to welcome his Heart Fund volunteer on Heart Sunday and to make a gift for every heart he loves."
