Brooks Split Game With Eagles Over Week End

on the short end of a basketball series with a strong Eagle Point team over the week end. They split the series, but lost the first and most important one 58-47. This game counted in conference standings, and pushed Eagle Point out in front in loop play.

However, the Bruins salvaged more than a little from the second outing, whipping the Eagles by a 35-29 mark. Eagle Point was rated third in class A ball in the Oregonian poll. They had lost only one game previously—to Crater, an AA school.

In the first game the Eagle's won it at the foul line, although they showed a superb, tall team. They swished through 24 free throws in 41 attempts, with the Bruins outscoring them from the field 20-17. The Bruins, playing a man to man defense, fouled often, 22 times, with Ron Bullock and Jerry Fox fouling out of the game. Eagle Point took a strong 20 to 14 lead at the end of the first quarter. Then at halftime the Eagles

had pushed to a 34-26. At the third period mark Eagle Point led 44-32 and it was all over but the shouting, although the Brooks scored well, 17 points in the final period, they couldn't come close.

Four Eagles were in the double figure score, with Dennis Boren hitting for 20 points, Jack Greb 12, Ron Weach 13, and Gary Foran 11.

Jerry Anderson played one of his best games for Brookings, hitting for six buckets and two free throws for 14 points, while steady Bill Workinger added 10, Marv Bullock six, Ron Bullock four, and Stan Gribble four.

Brooks Win Second

The second game, played Saturday night was a horse of a different color. Eagle Point, with the important game under their belt looked dead and lacked the old rah-rah. They settled down to take advantage of the Brooks—but it

didn't happen that way.

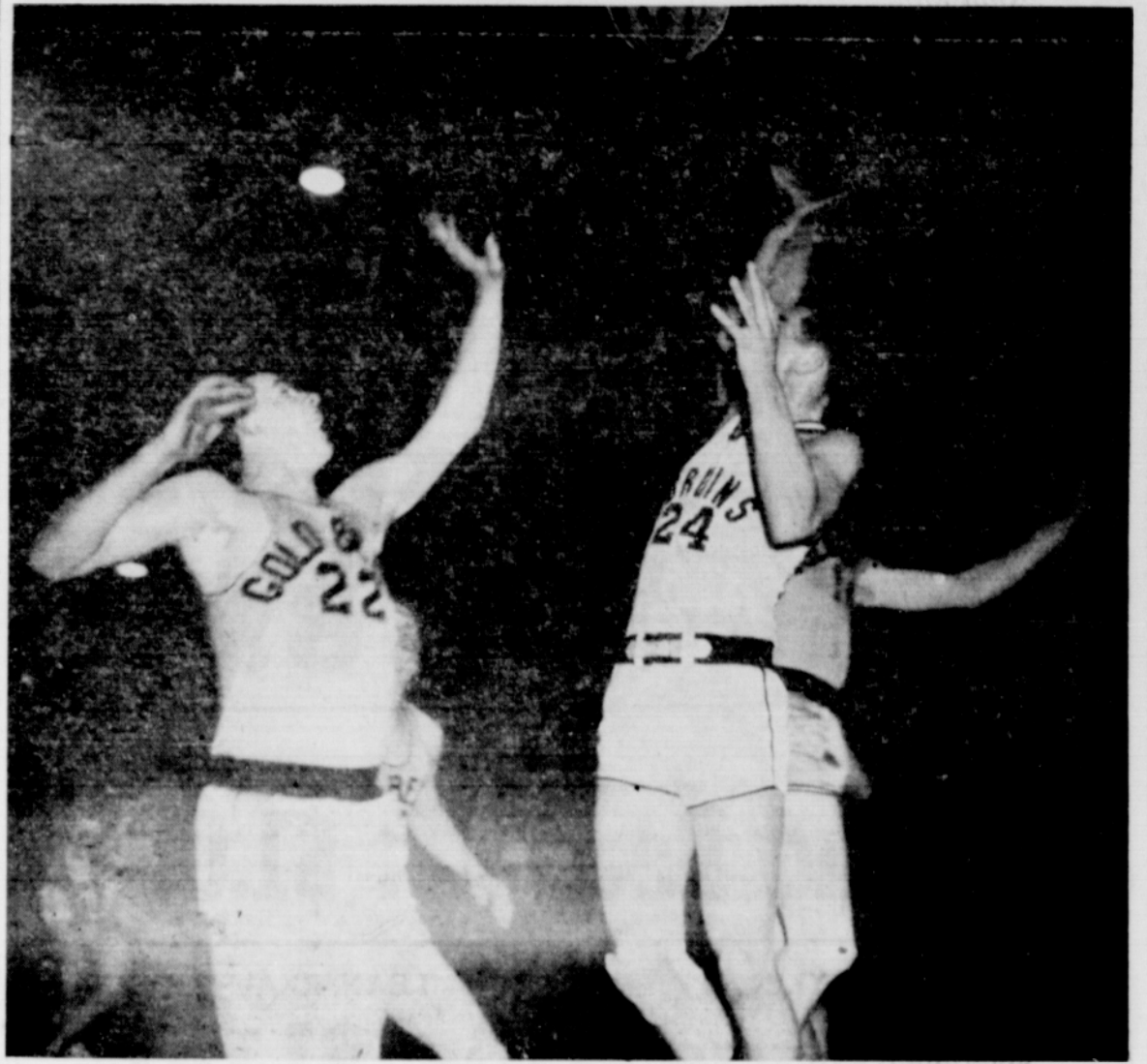
The Bruins put on as beautiful a defensive play as we've seen all year. Coach Cal Pace put them into a tight zone defense that didn't leave the tall Eagles many openings for good shots. Rebounding picked up for the Bruins too, with Marv Bullock and Ron Bullock especially grabbing off the boards.

Brookings held the vaulted Eagles to a mere five points in the first quarter, and at halftime had only allowed them 12. In the meantime Stan Gribble, Jerry Anderson, Marv Bullock and Ron Bullock each pumped in a couple of buckets to take a 18-12 lead.

It was more of the same in the second half, with a smooth functioning Bruin squad taking advantage of every Eagle mistake. Coach Pace only used six men in the outing, with Marv Bullock netting 11 points, Stan Gribble and Anderson each 10.

Eagle Point nearly caught the Brooks in the closing minutes, but some nifty stalling forced the Eagles to open up, allowing the Bruins to pull away in the closing seconds.

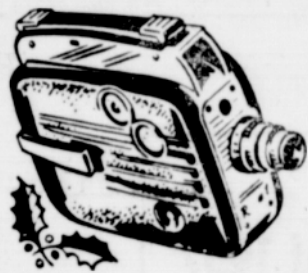
The JV squad followed in the footsteps of their elders. They lost the first game, after holding a 15 point lead at one time during the game. The second game, how-

The Brookings-Harbor school faculty team continued on its undefeated way Sunday afternoon, after trailing a "town team" most of the way, in a benefit performance for the March of Dimes.

A good crowd turned about \$70 into the fund to see the strong faculty team make a tremendous come-back after trailing in the final quarter. The final score was 40-19, with the teachers netting an unlikely 21 points in the final frame, while holding the All Stars to a mere five points.

DISABLED OREGON VETERANS NEED NOT SHOW STATEMENT TO PURCHASE LICENSE

This year thousands of disabled Oregon veterans will not be required to secure a statement of disability from the Veterans Administration in order to purchase a hunting or fishing license for only 50 cents, Chas. Langdon, manager of the VA Regional office at Portland, announced.

Oregon State Law provides that an honorably discharged war veteran, including one with Korean period service, who has resided in Oregon at least one year immediately preceding his application, and is "currently rated by the Veterans Administration as being at least 25 percent disabled" is eligible for a hunting or angling license for 50 cents, or a combination license for \$1.00.

To conform with the law, the Oregon State Game Commission has been requiring each applicant to secure a letter from the Veterans Administration annually to establish his eligibility.

The Game Commission this year has furnished the VA a list of all veterans who secured a license at reduced cost in 1956. The VA has processed the list through automatic tabulating machines and returned it to the Commission with a report of current disability rating for each veteran named.

Through this method most veterans will not have to contact the Veterans Administration for a letter of disability, since Game Commission headquarters in Portland

already has on record the list of eligibles. However each veteran applying for the low cost license must still fill out the Commission's application form and forward it with his check or money order to the State Game Commission at 1634 S. W. Alder in Portland.

Disabled veterans who did not apply for a reduced cost license in 1956 must secure a letter from the VA to be eligible in 1957. Only those presently receiving VA payments for disability of at least 25 percent can qualify for the letter of current rating.

The new system is expected to be a significant labor saver to both agencies concerned, as well as to veterans.
