Rites Said for Ida Mae Hubbell

Ida Mae Hubbell was born in Kirksville, Mo., February 7, 1864 and passed away at Santa Clara, Calif. on the 24th of January, 1957. She was in her 92nd year. She, with her late husband, William, came to make their home at Harbor in 1920, where they and their family filled many a place in the hearts of their neighbors. For some thirty years Mrs. Hubbell served as chaplain of the local Rebekah lodge and very rarely missed all the occasions when her services were required.

With her husband, she came to live at Harbor in May of 1920, and made her home there with her son, Frank Pallady, until about three years ago, going to California to be nearer the homes of her daughters, two of whom survive: Mrs. Ruth Hoffman of Saratoga, and Mrs. Lucille Irwin of Oakland, as well as her son. There are also eight grandchildren, ten great grandchildren, and 5 great great grandchildren.

Services for deceased were held at Wier's Mortuary, Crescent City, followed by graveside services at Smith River, conducted by the Brookings Rebekah Lodge. Pallbearers were Milton Foster, C. A. Page, George Hassett, Andrew Hoffeldt, Elmer Hanscam, and Bert Carlson.

Mill Production Off in State

Last week's adverse weather conditions throughout the Pacific Northwest brought a rash of logging shutdowns and frozen log ponds, and with it, a sharp drop-off in mill production, according to Random Lengths, Eugene weekly lumber letter.

Although freezing weather on the West Coast has turned to warm rain, road restrictions on log truck hauling during the thawing period will hold down Green mill production for another week or two.

The traditional pick-up in demand and strengthening of prices that heretofore usually accompanied such conditions so far has failed to materialize.

Demand, already abnormally low, was further weakened by severe weather that hit the consuming territories simultaneously. Thus any hopes for an improved lumber market, have been temporarily, at least dispelled.

Even with the small volume of orders, most of which call for difficult specifications, buyers find mill placement difficult. This situation will undoubtedly improve as mills resume production.

Retail yard buying of mixed cars of green and kiln dried lumber is still limited to a dribbling volume.

The market for Pine and associated species is in a state of confusion. Pine selects in grades of C and better are moving in fair volume, but "D" grade is in surplus, and prices are weak. No. 3 common Ponderosa Pine is the healthiest segment of the market, with price increases prevalent, particularly for 12-inch boards.

The \$72 basing price for quarter-inch AD plywood is still in effect. As most plants were idle last week, it is difficult to predict whether or not the new level will hold.

School Board Looks at Plan

Members of the Brookings-Harbor school district 17-c school board met last Thursday evening to interview Claude Freeman, architect of the firm of Freeman, Hayslip, Tuft and Hewlett. There was a general discussion on classroom costs and plans, and some were displayed.

The firm recently designed schools for Gold Beach and Crescent City. Earlier the school board had interviewed Robert Keeney of Medford, and Robert Fraby of Grants Pass, both architects.

Additional classroom space for the Brookings-Harbor district is under consideration by the board, although no definite plans have been proposed, especially in regard to financing.
