### Eagle Point Whips Brookings Twice Marv Bullock Breaks Collarbone

Bad luck, which has dodged the Brookings Bruins all season came in bunches Saturday night, as the Bruins lost a pair of Rogue River league outings to a highly ranked Eagle Point squad.

They lost the first game by only four points, 50-46, but the second game Saturday was the heart-breaker, as they lost 45-41 after leading almost all the way.

The Brooks pulled away to an almost unbelievable 12 point lead in the first quarter—but then ace center Marv Bullock, who has been one of the leading scorers broke his collarbone, and was taken out of the game.

Disheartened by this turn of events the Brooks saw their advantage disappear until one second before half time Jack Greb missed a free toss, and Wayne CChristian tipped in to tie the score at 22 all.

With Bill Workinger flipping in three field goals the Brooks moved out in front again 40-39 with four minutes to go. Eagle Point began fouling in an effort to get the ball, but Brookings could only make one out of five free throws, and they saw their lead over the strong Eagles go down the drain.

Jerry Anderson pumped in four field goals in the first quarter to help the Brooks pull away early. He ended with 14 points for the

evening. Stan Gribble had nine points, Ron Bullock eight, and Workinger six.

On Friday night, in the game that counted, it was a rough second quarter that threw the Brooks off. They hung with the Eagles throughout the first period, each hitting 13 points, but the Bruins could only add four points in the second quarter, while the Eagles hit for 16 to carry an impossible 13 point advantage.

However, some potent field goal work by Workinger with four goals brought the Bruins to a 34-40 disadvantage going into the final period. At the games end, with Jerry Anderson hitting well the Bruins only trailed by four points.

Workinger led the scoring with 16 points, while Anderson had 12, and Stan Gribble eight, Marv Bullock six, and Ron Bullock four.

Currently the Brooks hold a three way tie for second place, with Illinois Valley and Phoenix.
