Because of You This Little Miss is Well and Happy

The Brookings-Harbor Valen-Vining, 8-year-old second grade fine for 1957 is truly a "Heart Sweetheart." Little Pamela Hene was born with a bad heart and

for several years was a semi-invalid, pale and wan, unable to take part in normal childhood activities.

Today Pamela is the picture of health, a happy and normal life ahead of her. This was made possible by the Heart Association and the dimes and dollars YOU, the public, gave to Heart Fund.

In 1955, during a Child Clinic session at Brookings elementary school, it was found by Dr. Gibson that little Pamela must have immediate attention. She was sent with her mother to Portland where the finest surgeons took over and operated on December 21, 1955, at Dorenbecker hospital with all expenses paid. Their techniques were perfected through years of research. Only a few years ago surgery of this type would not have been possible by passing the heart, sending her blood through the arteries and veins while skilled hands performed the delicate surgery on the heart itself. YOUR research dollars made this possible.

Pamela is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Earl E. Vining who live up the Winchuck River Road. She has a sister, Patricia Jean 6, and a brother, Glen David 3. Mr. Vin-

ing is an employee of the Brookings Plywood.

When Pamela was taken to the doctor in Aberdeen, Wash., for her six-weeks check-up, it was found that she did not have a normal heart and it was known that only eventual surgery would save her life. At that time it was believed she could wait until about her twelfth year. However, when examined by Dr. Gibson here, it was determined that she could not wait so long, so immediate arrangements were made for her mother to take her to Portland. After two months they came back to Brookings with more than hope in their hearts, for Pamela was well. Now she has no restriction on her activities.

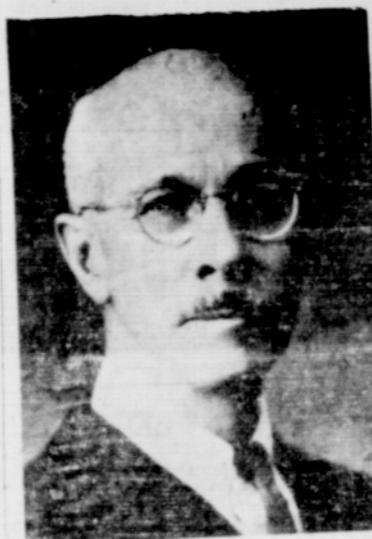

India Missionaries to Speak at Church



Dr. and Mrs. F. P. Manley, missionaries of the American Baptist Foreign Mission in Secunderabad, South India, will speak at a missionary meeting in the Baptist Community church at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, February 20.

Mrs. Manley will also speak to the Women's Missionary Society during the afternoon.

The Manleys do educational

work in Hyderabad State and find a challenging field of opportunity among the students of the colleges. The government maintains a T. B. hospital there in which they hold weekly services and Bible classes.

Secunderabad is only one of two mission stations where they take responsibility for the evangelistic work, the other being Hanumakonda.

Williams Visits St. Legislature

D. D. Williams, Supt. of the Brookings-Harbor school appeared in Salem last week to testify on house bill 171, which proposes to increase the Basic school support from \$80 to \$120 per census child.

Nearly 300 persons were at the hearing, and all those heard by the committee with one single exception were in favor. Williams reported that the legislators were very sympathetic to the situation. The bill was reported out unanimously by the Committee the following day.

Williams said too that it was reported that chances looked good that Congress will pass a measure giving some assistance for school construction.

The Superintendent also had an opportunity to talk landscape plans over with Wallace Ruff, who will draw up revised plans soon.
