Illinois Valley - Bruins Split Games

Brookings wound up their regular season play this past week end, by splitting two close games with a good Illinois Valley squad.

Both games were decided in the last second, with IV taking the conference win by a 41-40 score, edging out a win in the seasons in an overtime, and the Brooks finale by a 52-49 count after trailing 30-17 at half time.

Friday night on the IV court the Brooks took an early lead 15-13 at the first quarter mark, with Bill Workinger hitting for seven and Ron Bullock and Ron Lane each four. A good solid defense kept Illinois Valley from scoring a bucket in the second quarter and the Bruins carried a 28-16 lead at half time.

But scoring for the Brooks went into a nosedive from then on. They could only make a total of nine points in the next two quarters, while IV made 22 points to catch them at the wire. Brookings they were ahead by a 38-37 when the score was actually knotted at 37 all.

With 1.15 seconds left Gary Galambos made a free throw to put the Brooks ahead—but some-

body had stepped over the line to nullify the score, and the game went into overtime. In the wild overtime Dan Slanaker made his only basket of the night putting IV ahead 39-37. Then the Bruins tied it up again, before a technical foul, called on Stan Gribble for talking to the coach, and another T foul was called on a coach, with Larry Reston making the shot to win.

The game Saturday night was just the reverse, with IV getting off to a big lead, only to lose it in the last seconds. There 30-17 lead vanished by the end of the third quarter when the Brooks scored 19 points to trail by only four.

Wheeling along the Brooks hit 16 more in the final frame to win going away.

Scoring in the two games was pretty evenly divided as usual. Ron Bullock hit 12 on Friday and 15 on Saturday to lead the way in both games. Workinger had nine and 10, Lane had seven and eight. Stan Gribble had nine and four. Anderson had three and eight. Dale Rutledge hit four on Saturday night.

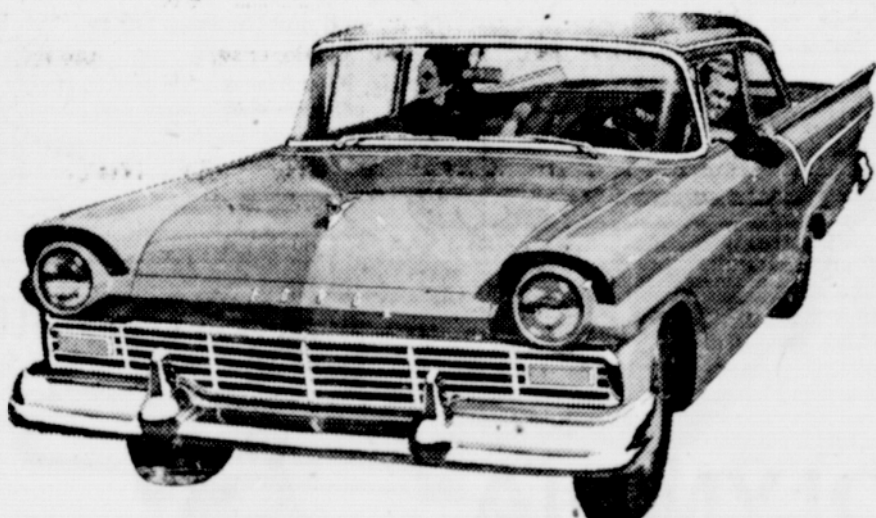
