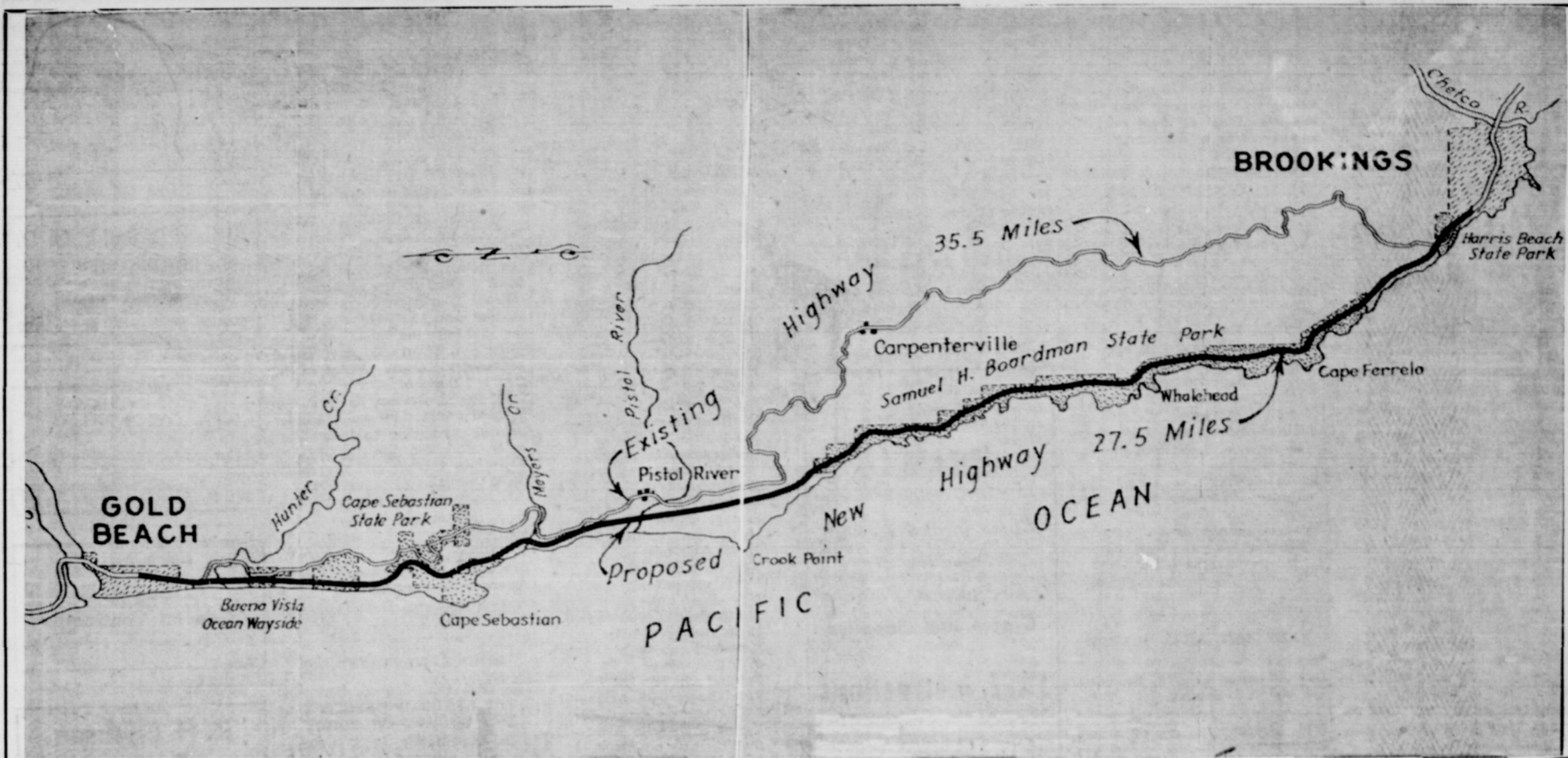


HERE IS PROPOSED RE-ALIGNMENT OF HIGHWAY 101 BETWEEN BROOKINGS AND GOLD BEACH.

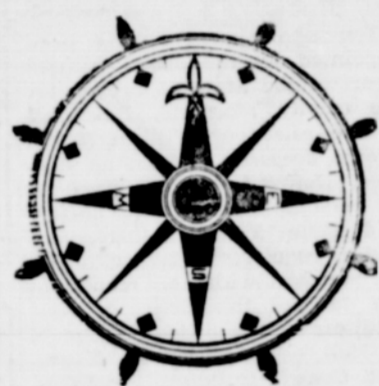

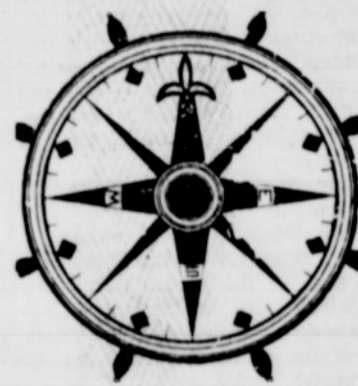

## Jetty Bids May Be Called On March 19th

### Grader May Be Bought for Brookings

Authorization of the Brookings council to purchase a grader for the city street department was the big item of business at the council meeting Tuesday night.

The council agreed to send Mayor Fell Campbell, councilman Ben Phetteplace and city Supt. Bill Spencer to Eureka to look at a grader, which would cost the city around \$5,000, after deducting the trade-in cost of the old grader.

It was brought out that the city's present grader was 26 years old, and incapable of doing the job. A new grader was deemed essential by the council.

Decision to purchase the grader hinged on how it looks, with a trial period, and the possibility of securing the budget committees approval, for the expenditure of the money.

In other actions the council:

1. Adopted the planning commissions recommendations that the city be divided into three voting precincts instead of two with the boundaries as follows, Brookings 1 South of highway 101 and west to Mill Beach Road, Brookings 2 North of highway 101 and west to Fourth St. Brookings 3. All area west of Mill Beach Road and Fourth St.

2. Decided to hold up hydrant rental payment to the Brookings Water Co. until hydrant in front of Ostenburgs in downtown Brookings is fixed.

3. Heard Attorney Sam Hall appear to protest any forthcoming ordinance licensing trading stamps. Hall, who represented S & H Green Stamps said that it was his belief that any such ordinance would be unconstitutional. Councilman Ben Phetteplace said that a study is being made, and it was possible that petitions would be circulated in the city requesting an ordinance.

4. Heard George Murry complain about logs placed in his drive way, and decided that the city had no jurisdiction in his case.

5. Decided to divide the city's printing business rather than let it out on bids as requested by Joe Murphy of the Pilot. Mayor Fell Campbell said that henceforth he would do the ordering.

6. Appointed Mrs. M. S. Brainard, and Mrs. Tom McKenzie to the Library Board of Trustees. Also on the Board are Don McCarton, Ben Jones and M. S. Brainard.

7. Appointed Jim Yelton on the

Budget Committee to replace Clive Manley. Also on the budget committee are Archie Hendricks, Bob Dimmick, Frenchie Arrell, and Murry Palmer. The group had their initial meeting last week.

8. Passed a motion that would give the Street Supt. Bill Spencer authority to buy a pump and other necessary equipment for the city sewer.

9. Passed a motion that would allow Police Chief Bud Cross to send defective parking meters in for an overhaul, on a trial basis.

10. Adjourned until Tuesday, April 9.

The property, recently purchased, is being leveled and graded for the trailers. Fred Fox will manage the operation.

### Cliff House Gets New Chef And Remodling

Something new has transpired at the Cliff House, Brookings night spot. First, operator Bill Preisinger is having the place remodeled and second a new chef, Fred Gerioux has arrived on the scene.

The remodeling is in progress now, and should be done by press time. A new thick plexy-glass partition has been installed, which will separate the bar from the dining area, making two separate places out of the Cliff House.

Also the small room adjoining the bar has been eliminated which will have the effect of making a cocktail lounge, with a place to dance. The barroom has been extended to include this room.

The new chef, Mr. Gerioux, comes to the Cliff House highly recommended, and with a background of experience. He was born in St. Mortiz, Switzerland, and came to the United States at 11.

When he was 13 he went back to Switzerland to attend the Berliotte School of Cuisine, to learn his trade. He spent four years studying under various internationally known chefs. Then Gerioux returned to the U. S. to serve his apprenticeship under his father, who recently retired after 47 years of being a chef.

Gerioux started first at the Romy-Plaza in Miami Beach, for two seasons, then to the Adolphus Hotel in Dallas, and then to the Muhlenbach Hotel in Kansas City. Gerioux was with the Statler Hotel chain for seven years, and was with the namesake of the local Cliff House, the Cliff House in San Francisco prior to coming here.

Recently installed in the Cliff House kitchen was a new Vulcan broiler, under Gerioux's direction. It is the only one of its kind in this part of the country. His specialty is sauces and soup and meats.

However, it was pointed out by the Commission, that there are a couple of factors which may cause them to miss this target date. But, notwithstanding, they do not expect the call for bids to be very long delayed.

There will be a short period between the call for bids and the date of opening bids. Construction on the project should start very shortly after the date for opening the bids, it was believed by the group.

The Port Commission met Friday evening for a three hour session, in which it worked toward getting all matters in shape of the bid call.

The Commission also adopted a resolution, printed elsewhere in this issue of the Pilot, commending attorney Ed Ackley for the time and effort he has put into the Port of Brookings. The Commission has appointed attorney Sam Hall to serve as their legal counsel.

### Local Post Office Sets New Hours

Postmaster Bill Thompson announced that the window hours of the Brookings postoffice would be changed because of a lopped post-office budget. He said that in order to cut down clerk hours, the windows would be open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., and from 9 a.m. to 12 noon on Saturdays. Currently the windows open at 8 a.m. and are open until 5:30 p.m.

Thompson said that this will not hamper the mail dispatch in any way, and all our services would be as is. The new hours will start March 17.

### South Coast Mill Set to Open Soon

The South Coast operation will begin work on Monday, March 18th. At least that is the plan now, depending on a few factors, according to plant authorities.

All of their new heavy equipment is in, and a process of "but-toning up" is now underway. Officials say that it is likely the plant will start out with a single shift until the testing on the new saw process is complete, and then go on the double shift.
