### PERMIT NEEDED TO BRING MILK INTO OREGON FROM CALIFORNIA

How is it that milk from California, Idaho and Washington comes freely into Oregon? That question, in one form or another, seems to be popping up at this time.

So the state department of agriculture dairy chief, O. K. Beals, gives the answers so everyone interested may know. At the same time, as you will see, he relates that milk produced in Oregon moves freely into each of the other states.

This movement back and forth is due to the law of reciprocity written into the Oregon milk code in 1951. Under this reciprocal agreement section of the law, the department may enter into an agreement with other states to permit milk to cross state lines. The reason: to assure that Oregon people have a continuous supply of wholesome milk.

But certain provisions are laid down. Before milk from another state can come into Oregon markets, the inspection procedures and permission for movement are all written down in black and white in a formal agreement.

Under these formal agreements Oregon accepts the inspection of the state from which the milk or milk products come. This avoids costly duplicate inspection.

Right now, seven Washington distributors hold permits to enter four Oregon markets: Rainier and St. Helens; Hermiston, Heppner, Pendleton and Arlington; Milton-Freewater; and Cascade Locks.

Also four Idaho distributors move milk under Oregon permit into Ontario, Nyssa, Vale, Baker, La Grande, Burns and John Day. And three California plants, working under similar arrangements, sell milk in Brookings, Gold Beach and Klamath Falls.

But before neighboring milk comes in, as you already noted, these out-of-state dairy plants must obtain an interstate milk shipper's permit from the department of agriculture at Salem, Or. put it in reverse if it is Oregon milk going into one of the neighboring states.

Before the permit is issued, whichever way the milk flows, dairy specialists of Oregon and the other state conduct a joint inspection of a cross-section of the dairies involved in this over-the-border movement. This joint inspection is repeated once each year. It also includes plants sending milk into Oregon.

Sanitation standards in the four states are essentially the same, so each accepts the other's grade certifications without question. Each state does, however, send the other a copy of laboratory analysis on all samples of milk and milk products from dairies or plants involved in the mutual agreement.

Oregon does, however, sample out-of-state milk in our markets regularly, right along with milk which stays at home. That is why, if you are familiar with the quarterly publication of milk analysis published by the department of agriculture, you will find milk from out of the state listed right along with the other reports.

Oregon handles directly, however, the Bang's test requirements in all milk coming into our markets. This is because Oregon is the only state that requires a

blood test. Oregon has not recognized the ring test, which is accepted by Washington and Idaho. California does not require either test for its dairy herds but does have a compulsory calfhood vaccination program.

Which means that Oregon requires all out-of-state plants shipping milk here to have their producer herds blood tested annually and file the results with the department in Salem. This testing for brucellosis (Bang's) must be done by an approved and licensed veterinarian in the neighbor state.

Just to finish the picture, Beals says at the present time Oregon milk is crossing into neighboring states at a number of points. Some of it comes back on our markets in processed form.

Milk processed in Klamath Falls and Brookings is going into California points; also Oregon distributors are going into Crescent City and a number of markets in Alturas and surrounding markets. Over on the eastern side, a dairy at Nyssa is distributing milk over the line into Idaho.
